Sec. 20. (1) Practice of occupational therapy means the therapeutic 12 use of everyday life occupations with persons, groups, or populations to 13 14 support occupational performance and participation. Occupational therapy 15 practice includes clinical reasoning and professional judgment to evaluate, analyze, and diagnose occupational challenges and provide 16 17 occupation-based interventions. Occupational therapy services include habilitation, rehabilitation, and the promotion of physical and mental 18 19 health and wellness for clients with all levels of ability-related needs. 20 These services are provided to a client who has, or is at risk for, 21 developing an illness, injury, disease, disorder, condition, impairment, 22 disability, activity limitation, or participation restriction. Through 23 the provision of skilled services and engagement in everyday activities, 24 occupational therapy promotes physical and mental health and well-being 25 by supporting occupational performance in a person with, or at risk of 26 experiencing, a range of developmental, physical, and mental health 27 disorders. 28 (2) The practice of occupational therapy includes the following 29 <u>components:</u>

30 (a) Evaluation of factors affecting activities of daily living,
 31 instrumental activities of daily living, health management, rest and

sleep, education, work, play, leisure, and social participation, and 1 2 includes environmental and personal factors and occupational and activity 3 demands that affect performance; (b) Performance patterns, including habits, routines, roles, and 4 5 <u>rituals;</u> 6 (c) Performance skills, including motor skills, process skills, and 7 social interaction skills; 8 (d) Client factors, including body functions and structures, values, 9 and spirituality; (e) Methods or approaches to identify and select intervention, 10 including (i) establishment, remediation, or restoration of a skill or 11 12 ability that has not yet developed, is impaired, or is in decline, (ii) 13 compensation, modification, or adaptation of occupations, activities, and 14 contexts to improve or enhance performance, (iii) maintenance of 15 capabilities to prevent decline in performance of everyday life occupations, (iv) health promotion and wellness to enable or enhance 16 17 performance of everyday life activities and quality of life, and (v) prevention of occurrence or emergence of barriers to performance and 18 19 participation, including injury and disability prevention; and 20 (f) Interventions and procedures to promote or enhance safety and 21 performance in activities of daily living, independent activities of 22 daily living, health management, rest and sleep, education, work, play, 23 leisure, and social participation, and includes: 24 (i) Therapeutic use of occupations and activities; 25 (ii) Training in self-care, self-management, health management, home 26 management, community and work integration, school activities, and work 27 performance; (iii) Identification, development, remediation, or compensation of 28 29 physical, neuromusculoskeletal, sensory-perceptual, emotional regulation, 30 visual, and mental and cognitive functions, pain tolerance and

Supervision means a collaborative process for responsible, 4 5 periodic review and inspection of all aspects of occupational therapy 6 services where (1) the occupational therapist is responsible for 7 occupational therapy services provided by an occupational therapy 8 assistant or an aide, and (2) an occupational therapy assistant is 9 responsible for the occupational therapy services provided. The goal of supervision is to ensure the safe and effective delivery of occupational 10 11 <u>therapy.</u> 12 Sec. 22.
