38-2510 (1) Practice of occupational therapy means the therapeutic 8 9 use of everyday life occupations with persons, groups, or populations to 10 support occupational performance and participation. Occupational therapy 11 practice includes clinical reasoning and professional judgment to evaluate, analyze, and diagnose occupational challenges and provide 12 occupation-based interventions. Occupational therapy services include 13 14 habilitation, rehabilitation, and the promotion of physical and mental 15 health and wellness for clients with all levels of ability-related needs. 16 These services are provided to a client who has, or is at risk for, 17 developing an illness, injury, disease, disorder, condition, impairment, disability, activity limitation, or participation restriction. Through 18 19 the provision of skilled services and engagement in everyday activities, 20 occupational therapy promotes physical and mental health and well-being 21 by supporting occupational performance in a person with, or at risk of 22 experiencing, a range of developmental, physical, and mental health 23 <u>disorders.</u>

24 (2) The practice of occupational therapy includes the following
 25 components:

(a) Evaluation of factors affecting activities of daily living,
 instrumental activities of daily living, health management, rest and
 sleep, education, work, play, leisure, and social participation, and
 includes environmental and personal factors and occupational and activity
 demands that affect performance;

31 (b) Performance patterns, including habits, routines, roles, and

1 rituals; 2 (c) Performance skills, including motor skills, process skills, and 3 social interaction skills; (d) Client factors, including body functions and structures, values, 4 5 and spirituality; 6 (e) Methods or approaches to identify and select intervention, 7 including (i) establishment, remediation, or restoration of a skill or 8 ability that has not yet developed, is impaired, or is in decline, (ii) 9 compensation, modification, or adaptation of occupations, activities, and contexts to improve or enhance performance, (iii) maintenance of 10 capabilities to prevent decline in performance of everyday life 11 occupations, (iv) health promotion and wellness to enable or enhance 12 13 performance of everyday life activities and quality of life, and (v) 14 prevention of occurrence or emergence of barriers to performance and 15 participation, including injury and disability prevention; and 16 (f) Interventions and procedures to promote or enhance safety and 17 performance in activities of daily living, independent activities of daily living, health management, rest and sleep, education, work, play, 18 19 leisure, and social participation, and includes: 20 (i) Therapeutic use of occupations and activities; 21 (ii) Training in self-care, self-management, health management, home 22 management, community and work integration, school activities, and work 23 performance; (iii) Identification, development, remediation, or compensation of 24 25 physical, neuromusculoskeletal, sensory-perceptual, emotional regulation, 26 visual, and mental and cognitive functions, pain tolerance and 27 management, praxis, developmental skills, and behavioral skills; (iv) Education and training of persons, including family members, 28 29 caregivers, groups, and populations; 30 (v) Care coordination, case management, and transition services; 31 (vi) Consultation services to persons, groups, populations,

1 (1) Occupational therapy means the use of purposeful activity with 2 individuals who are limited by physical injury or illness, psychosocial 3 dysfunction, developmental or learning disabilities, or the aging process 4 in order to maximize independent function, prevent further disability, 5 and achieve and maintain health and productivity.

6 (2) Occupational therapy encompasses evaluation, treatment, and 7 consultation and may include (a) remediation or restoration of 8 performance abilities that are limited due to impairment in biological, 9 physiological, psychological, or neurological processes, (b) adaptation 10 of task, process, or the environment, or the teaching of compensatory 11 techniques, in order to enhance performance, (c) disability prevention 12 methods and techniques which facilitate the development or safe application of performance skills, and (d) health promotion strategies 13 14 and practices which enhance performance abilities.

15 (3) Occupational therapy does not include the use of joint 16 manipulation, grade five mobilization or manipulation, thrust joint 17 manipulation, high-velocity or low-amplitude thrust, or any other 18 procedure intended to result in joint cavitation. Joint manipulation 19 commences where grades one through four mobilization ends.

Continuing education continuing competency 16 is sufficient to meet requirements. Such 17 requirements may also include, but not be limited to, one or more of the continuing competency activities listed in section 38-145 which a 18 licensed person may select as an alternative to continuing education. 19

20 (2) The board may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations 21 governing the training courses for an occupational therapist to be 22 certified to administer a physical agent and instrument-assisted 23 modalities modality. Electromagnetic modality means the use of electromagnetic 3 waves, including radio waves, microwaves, and light waves, to transport 4 electrical and magnetic energy through space to effect changes in body 5 <u>structures.</u> 6 Instrument-assisted modality means the therapeutic use of Sec. 21. 7 an instrument or tool that is manually applied by a trained practitioner 8 to target specific tissues including skin, fascia, and other connective 9 tissues or muscle. Mechanical modality means the therapeutic use of a 10 Sec. 22. mechanical device to apply force, such as compression, distraction, 11 12 vibration, or controlled mobilization, to modify biomechanical properties 13 and functions of tissues. 14 Sec. 23. Supervision means a collaborative process for responsible, 15 periodic review and inspection of all aspects of occupational therapy services where (1) the occupational therapist is responsible for 16 17 occupational therapy services provided by an occupational therapy assistant or an occupational therapy aide, and (2) an occupational 18 19 therapy assistant is responsible for the occupational therapy services 20 provided by the assistant. The goal of supervision is to ensure the safe

21 and effective delivery of occupational therapy services.
