Summary of purpose and/or changes:

LB 610 requires DHHS to seek any federal approvals for the implementation of the Ground Emergency Medical Transport Act (GEMT) and eliminates the current requirements of submitting a state plan amendment.



Sec. 1: The supplemental reimbursement shall be distributed exclusively to eligible providers on the basis of actual and allowable costs that are federally permissible.

Sec. 2: Language is added that the certification must conform to the federal regulation (42 C.F.R. 433.51) as it existed on January 1, 2025, including any applicable federal requirements.

Sec. 3: On or before January 1, 2026, DHHS shall seek any necessary federal approvals for the implementation of Ground Emergency Medical Transport Act. DHHS may limit the program to those costs that are allowable expenditures under the federal Social Security Act as such act and sections existed on January 1, 2025.

Language relating to requiring DHHS to submit a state plan amendment to CMS and requiring federal approval is removed.

Sec. 4: Harmonizes DHHS statute regarding the submitting of claims with the new language in subsection 2 of Sec. 3 of this bill. Cites the Ground Emergency Medical Transport Act regarding judicial determinations.

Sec. 5: To the extent federal approval is obtained, the increased capitation payments are changed to January 1, 2025.

Explanation of amendments:

AM267 to 610 requires the supplemental reimbursement to not exceed, instead of equal, the amount of financial participation received as a result of the claims submitted.

DHHS is allowed to distribute the supplemental reimbursement to eligible providers under a payment method based on ground emergency medical transport services. The language, shall be distributed exclusively" is removed.

AM267 strikes "shall" and inserts "may" which allows, instead of requiring, DHHS to seek any necessary federal approvals for the implementation of this act.

AM267 strikes "shall" and inserts "may" which allows, instead of requiring, DHHS to submit claims for federal financial participation for the expenditures of the services.

AM267 strikes "shall" and inserts "may" which allows, instead of requiring, DHHS to annually submit any necessary materials to the federal government to provide assurances that claims for federal financial participation will include only those expenditures that are allowable under federal law.

The commencement date, to the extent federal approval is obtained, of increased capitation payments is changed from 2025 to 2026.
