SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, I rise for a point of personal question, how's that. I do have a question, I don't know who to direct it to, its either to the Clerk, or the Body. In front of you, you have a set of, or not a set, it's an incomplete set of statues. My request is this, I have a set of statues at home, in my office at home, now to get another set back down here to the office I have to transfer them back and forth. It makes it rather inconvenient taking them home every night and bringing them back to the office every morning. I only have one set, that's all that was issued to us two years ago. I would like to request from this body that each person is allowed two sets of statues book, one for his office and one for home and then possibly if we could have a set on these rows, every other row or something, it would make it a little more convenient because so many of these bills refer to sections of the statues, so I would like to find out who I'm to request this from.

SPEAKER: The distribution of statues is set by statutes.

SENATOR BARNETT: So what would we have to do to change it?

SPEAKER: Just put an amendment in and run through an emergency.

SENATOR BARNETT: Take one of my ten bills and introduce it? It couldn't be taken care of through the Executive Board by any chance? Okay. Thank You.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the legislature I've been chafing here for several minutes. I'm rising on a point of personal privilege. I feel I'm not out of order because a statement was made and the maker of the statement said it was directed to me personally. What I have to say about dignity is that it does not exist or consist of what a man wears, more of it is determined by his conduct and by what he is. I think dignity can be found if a man gives his word and then keeps his word. As far as personal attire is concerned I think cleanliness is the primary factor we ought to be concerned about. And as far as the type of clothing that some men wear in this chamber, perhaps if they were in better physical shape, they might not mind taking off their coats. But if it is extremely difficult for some men in this chamber to talk to me because I don't wear a shirt with a necktie, I'm wearing a shirt by the way, I'll compromise to show how reasonable I can be when forced to, I'll buy a white shirt, a white shirt, and I'll bring it down here and set it on my desk, and for people who are more impressed by what a man wears then what the man is, he can talk to that shirt, and when he completes his talk with that shirt and decides he wants to talk to the man then I'll listen to anything he has to say.
