this Legislature could spend the money more effectively. Fifty sets of statutes down here or two sets of statutes aren't going to radically change our knowledge of law. If somebody wants to find out some point of law, they can go back and look it up very quickly.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp, my suggestion would be let's get more sets of law books up there at the college. I think probably they need them. I know they need a new building and we are going along with that and I will go along with it, fine. I am certainly dismayed to hear that you have to go check out a set of statutes amongst two hundred students up there in order to find anything and I think proper textbooks are very necessary.

SPEAKER: Senator Johnson. We have Senator Proud's motion under discussion which is just to supply two sets.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Mr. President, I ask what a set of law books cost? What are we talking about in the way of expense.

SPEAKER: Approximately \$120.00, the chair is advised. Pardon me, sir. For a set of statutes. Any further discussion of the Proud amendment. Senator Proud, do you wish to close? The question is shall the Proud amendment be adopted which would place two sets of statutes under the protection of the Sergeant at Arms and be made available to the body. All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. Voting on the Proud amendment to the Simpson amendment to LB 1. We're away and running. Senator Hasebroock voting aye. Senator Hasebroock voting aye. Once again the chair would ask if you have all voted? The clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 20 ayes, Mr. President, 14 nays, 15 not voting.

SPEAKER: The amendment prevails to Senator Simpson's amendment. Senator Simpson, we are now back to your amendment to LB 1.

SENATOR SIMPSON: Mr. President, I move it be adopted as amended.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the Simpson amendment as amended. All those in favor of the Simpson amendment say aye, those opposed say no. So ordered, back to LB 1 as amended. Senator Simpson, what is your pleasure? Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, I move that LB 1 be advanced to the General File, off the General File to Enrollment and Review. Mr. President and members of the Legislature, LB 1 is a Revisor's Bill and for new members of the Legislature if you have not already been briefed as to what Revisors Bills are the intent of the Revisor Bill is to make the statutes conform to bills already passed or laws already on the books or to correct typographical or other minor errors in the statutes. This has been done by the Revisor of Statutes and you will note that most of them are that type of a corrective bill. They are susceptible to amendment as you have just seen and I would merely state that this particular LB 1 merely sets forth in detail the responsibility of the Revisor Of Statutes and the Legislature, namely the Executive Board of the Legislative Council in getting the statutes out.
