SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion of the amendment? All those in favor of the amendment as explained by Senator Carpenter say aye, those opposed say no. The amendment is adopted as so ordered, ready to the bill 83 as amended what is your pleasure Senator Carpenter? Senator Carpenter your amendment was adopted sir.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Senator Goodrich suggested for example on line eight, that we have the same 5 year limitation, and he suggests we amend that to 2 years also. Now that section provides for example for the sale of these instruments for the 25¢. Nor the committee did -

CLERK: I construed your original motion to apply to the, I wrote applies to both sections.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I just want to thank, we have a very competent Clerk. I now move the bill be advanced from general file to E & R. SPEAKER: Have you all voted? The clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 35 ayes Mr. President, and no nays, remainder not voting.
