not going to give us one anyway and if he did it doesn't mean anything, only the courts can determine whether he is right or wrong, and the courts will hear nothing until we do something, if we pass a bill to repeal what we did then the courts have something before them. If we are not willing to do that, the issue is completely resolved and remains as it is. I hope you'll not embarrass the Attorney General of the State.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the motion? Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, I would like to speak in behalf of the largest minority in the State of Nebraska, represented by one person, in fact a minority so great it happens to be a majority, but I think this is not an unduly great request, I saw nothing in the motion that suggested setting aside any hearing, so in this respect I'm not speaking against holding hearings, any time we want to hold hearings on any subject, I think it good and productive, but I would like to point out that we do have an Attorney General who happens to be an attorney, most of us aren't and I don't think this is too much a request that Senator Marsh has asked in here and I would urge the body to support what I would consider a modest request.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the motion? Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. President I would like to ask Senator Marsh a question.

SPEAKER: Senator Marsh will you yield to a question?

SENATOR KEYES: Yes, now Senator Marsh this information that you have that we may not be able to undo what we have done, would that be from the Supreme Court of the land, would that be on the Federal Level or is that on the State level that you are speaking?

SENATOR MARSH: I'm talking on the Federal level, if you would be interested I have the legal references with me and I also have visited with the Attorney General of the State of Nebraska.

SENATOR KEYES: Then it is a Federal issue, it ceases to be a state issue when we start to repeal it. Then perhaps we should get the opinion of the Federal government on this instead of our state government.

SENATOR MARSH: I think you will find your State Attorney General can give you the Federal information sir.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the legislature, I have a double interest in this in the outcome of what's being proposed this morning, first of all the resolution has been referred to the committee of which I'm chairman and I'll guarantee that there will be a fair hearing. I think there ought to be a hearing, because women are not children and I think they have been patronized long enough and the opportunity should be given for them to speak for themselves in terms of their own rights. I believe that this resolution will give them an opportunity to organize politically and see how much power and strength they do have and they can not leave the protection and guarantee of their rights to the chivalry of we insecure men who feel threatened and challenged by the existence of women, so here is the question I want to ask, if the Attorney General would sight for us the legal references that Senator Marsh is referring to and if he says that he doubts that the legislature can resend the action it has already taken, what, maybe I should ask the clerk, or you what would happen to the resolution, would it cease to exist and everything would be cancelled or just what course would be taken by the legislature?
