SENATOR CARPENTER: that all resolutions are referred to the Executive Council for reference to a Committee Hearing unless the rules are suspended. I think that really this much ado about nothing, but I can remember one resolution we passed which was introduced, I remember by Senator Simmons, from Fremont, who believed in economy, and this body passed the resolution to say we didn't want any Federal Funds. Well the Congress from Ohio took it at it's face value and as the excuse he said "brother you're not going to get any", and we didn't. So these things are more far reaching than we anticipate, they might be, and if you give people not a reason but an excuse, that's all their looking for, so I think that we ought to consider the amending of rule if that's in order to send all resolutions to the Executive Council to be referred to a Committee for a hearing unless, we can convince this body to suspend the rules and pass the resolution.

SPEAKER: Senator Carpenter, the Chair is unable to accept you're amendment because the rules of the legislature state that all amendments to the rules, etc., will be submitted to the rules committee. If you'd care to put it in writing and submit it to the Clerk, we'll see that it goes to the Rules Committee.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well then I move to send this rule back to the Committee for another hearing and consideration of other amendments.

SPEAKER: Motion is to send the rule back to the Committee. Is there any further discussion of that motion? Senator Duis. The motion now is to return this rule to the committee for further discussion.

SENATOR DUIS: You know I'll concur in this motion and I hope it passes, now I want to make it clear to the legislature that we, at the time this rule change was introduced we announced publicly here in the legislature the time, place of the hearing. Now all of a sudden we get a lot of noise out here about how this rule should be done, but you know I didn't see any body at the hearing, so let's come to the hearing this time and we'll get extra chairs and hold it some place else and we'll get this straightened out because folks the rules committee, your rules committee only brings back to you those things that come before it and your the ones that introduced it so you got it back here again, so when we have this hearing again, I'd like to see you all there.

SPEAKER: Now the motion before us now is to return this rule change to the committee, the Chair recognizes, actually Senator Chambers was next to speak, Senator Chambers however, we have, do you wish to speak on what's before us now? The Chair recognizes Senator Luedtke and Senator Hasebroock.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President and members of the legislature it's alright with me to take it back to the committee, but I would very much appreciate it Senator Duis, if you would have that meeting some day when I can be there, as this was my rule change proposal and I do wish we would live with it long enough to find out what it would do. We've only had a couple of instances of it, and we suspended the rules in one of those cases which you can do, and I think we have all kinds of flexibility with this rule, by merely suspending the rules when we get into an emergency situation. I don't see any problem with it if we just let it work for us to save the time and it is perfectly ridiculous to suggest that we don't have hearings on rules as Senator Keyes because we have specifically provided when we have important changes we handle them like any bill, we can send them to committee, we can debate them on the floor, there has been nothing to change that. The only rule that applies to resolutions that cuts the time is
