it as a motion but rather as a suggestion to Senator Rasmussen, that we do take some additional time and I'll be glad to work with him to get the necessary information that I think all of us need to vote wisely on the resolution and perhaps we might want to amend the resolution in one or two specific areas.

SPEAKER: I have a number of Senators asking for the floor, Senator Rasmussen did you have a comment?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Mr. Speaker, fellow members, I would ask for unanimous consent to enter this, to reconsider to put this on file to go through the Ag Committee.

SPEAKER: In other words Senator Rasmussen if I understand you correctly, you are asking to withdraw your motion to vote on this and to let the resolution take it's course in accordance with the rules.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: That's correct Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER: Now, is there any objection to that? In other words Senator Rasmussen is asking that we not take up his motion for approval of the resolution and that it be permitted to lie on the Clerk's desk for five days as provided by the rules during which time anybody can come up and sign it that so desires. No is there any objection to that? Senator Kennedy did you want to speak to this proposition? Yes, we will wait a moment. In the meantime Senator Kime was asking for the floor. Senator Kime did you have any comments? I might suggest that the question under consideration is Senator Rasmussen's request to withdraw his motion. Senator Kime.

SENATOR KIME: Mr. Chairman, no I don't have anything to say about, I was just going to inform Senator Syas in regard to the rural electric association but that's too late now. I'll talk to him privately.

SPEAKER: Senator Maresh were seeking the floor?

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. Speaker and members of the legislature, I have some information on the REAP Program, and what this amounts to the State. During the years 1969, 1970 and 1971, the Federal Government provided \$9,737,600.00 to assist the farmers in conservation work. Grass seeding amounted to \$1,500,000.00, sod water-ways \$1,500,000.00, terraces and diversion \$2,138,000.00, dams and pits for irrigation run-off and erosion control and livestock dams, \$3,000,000.00 just about \$4,000,000.00 falling of trees \$375,000.00, and feed lot waste control, this practice has been used only in 1971, so this is for one year, \$123,395.00, strip cropping \$50,306.00 so you can see what a fiscal impact this, this has on the State's economy.

SPEAKER: We still have a number of requests for the floor which of course I will recognize, but Senator Rasmussen has another request. Senator Rasmussen.

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Mr. Speaker due to all the discussion on this, I would ask that we bracket this -

SPEAKER: Would you like unanimous consent to bracket this today, during which time you, during which interval you can discuss this (inaudible) to what day would you like to bracket it Senator?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: Tomorrow.

SPEAKER: Senator is asking for unanimous consent to bracket this until tomorrow. Now are there any objections? Senator Burbach. Then Senator Kennedy.
