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who would normally have the children move west or someplace like that, consequently you get into the growing parts of Omaha, where there is new construction and you're in some cases on half days schools, and so forth, because of lack of buildings and its unfair to the children of the city to not have the proper facilities the whole school in, I was out campaigning in my district and I come upon a block and I was going to knock on the doors and I noted a little sign on the door, public school, and it dawned on me and I inquired of the neighbor up the block, and there were about eight houses in a row, that were school houses for the Omaha school district, at least I assume they were the Omaha School district, they're in my district, that because of, naturally we don't have the school building, now in Northwest High we built Northwest High and it's a growing area of town, I made a prediction that there will be more people in Omaha in that particular area of town in the next ten years than any other legislative district in the state, when we go to redistrict again. We need these buildings and we can't keep up with these population shifts, by a four mill levy, I have perfect confidence in the Omaha school board which incidently are elected by the people to utilize their money wisely and I wish I had a map of the city of Omaha, of the Omaha school district rather in front of me today so I could illustrate this population generally speaking, this population shift that has caused disruption of where the children are relative to where the school buildings should be. I urge this legislature to not indefinitely postpone this bill, to pass the bill on to final reading and I hope it passes, on one of the present mill levy in particular I might say in the Senator Skarda's district, I understand he has got a new bill, new building coming up. I need them in my district, very much so and I think other Senators need facilities in their district. Therefore, I would urge the members of this legislature to not postpone this bill and send it on it's normal course to final reading.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Proud, then Senator Kelly, then Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR PROUD: Well Mr. President I personally don't live in Omaha school district, but I do represent some people who do live there. Senator, most of the, practically all of the Omaha delegation, the Douglas County delegation live in the city of Omaha, so I'm interested that Senator Skarda has put the indefinite postponement motion on this, he lives in the city of Omaha, and I presume in the Omaha school district. Senator Mahoney lives there, I'm anxious to hear from him too, I voted tentatively to advance the bill at the same time I haven't made up my mind, as of right now, how I'm going to vote on this motion, because I have a question to ask Senator Stahmer.

SPEAKER: Senator Stahmer will you yield to a question?

SENATOR PROUD: Stahmer I'm certainly in favor of having adequate buildings, at the same time I get lots of complaints from tax payers in my district, furthermore I'm up for reelection in about a year and a half, you've announced you're not going to run again, I don't want to put you on the spot but I understood that from the press or somebody, now is it, and I'm sorry to be so misinformed on this but I wasn't at the public hearing, I'm not a member of the Committee, cannot the people vote to float bonds to construct buildings?

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. Speaker Proud I'm glad you raised the question because there are two things I wanted to touch on in my original address but I did not cover them, we are paying over three and a half million dollars a year right now in bond costs, which could obviously we weren't spending that three and a half million each year for bonds build enough school buildings to more than take care of our needs. But the bond costs are not only are great on the district now but the bond charges themselves are now so high that if indeed the citizens were to
