SENATOR NORE: Mr. Speaker and fellow members, yesterday we were given the impression, at least I was, that the county treasurers were for this bill and by accident I ran into some of them over in the lounge. They were in for a bill and I find out they are absolutely opposed to this particular piece of legislation. There are two enatives?? where the treasurers might be for it, per se, and that would Omaha and Lincoln but outside of--in outstate Nebraska, they're absolutely, avidly against this piece of legislation. Now that comes from some of the officers of the County Treasurer's Association and County Officials Association. Now why are we giving these people legislation they don't want. This piece of legislation is in--it has a selfish interest. It is for some of our big, large chain retailers of which I am not too friendly towards because they are putting many of our small businesses out of business who have built our communities. They have set up on the edge of our towns and sort of rape our towns with unethical business practices, in my mind they are. Cost cutting --pricing, keeping open on Sunday, etcetera. This is the folks that is probably wanting to get this piece of legislation so that--. People in outstate Nebraska don't want this.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Marsh. We are still speaking on Senator Waldron's motion to indefinitely postpone LB 128.

SENATOR MARSH: I would like to draw attention to the physical note which is with 128. Instead of costing the taxpayers over \$300,000.00, the way I read it it says the total program will cost \$227,000.00. However, there will be income of \$192,000.00, so this is not the expense that it was indicated it was.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Goodrich, then Senator Stromer.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, members of the body, I rise in opposition to the kill motion. The way I look at this particular bill is that the total cost that Senator Waldron referred to is 25¢ per year per each person that holds a driver's license. This is \$1.00 for four years. You divide that you get 25¢. Now what other benefit. For example, if we can use the driver's license as a method by which we can identify cash--the people that cash checks or buy merchandise in a department store and slow down, what I call the con artist, the paper hangers as they are sometimes referred to, that will slow down the price increases of the merchandise that we as consumers have to pick up. So it's well worth 25¢ per year if we can slow down the con artist that possibly cost us a lot more than that in the price of the merchandise that we buy that they get away with.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Stromer, then Senator Stahmer, then Senator Anderson, then Senator Kennedy.

SENATOR STROMER: Mr. President and fellow members, Senator Waldron has issued his annual attempt to kill this particular bill trying to point up the cost. I think as Senator Marsh has already pointed out that the first year for the fiscal note it would only be a cost to the General Fund of approximately \$10,000.00 which is not anywhere close.
