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below, and I'm in favor of the intent of the idea of having the Legislative Hearing areas, or the building, or whatever you might say, rooms, offices, or such around the state but my next question is would this give the Legislative Council without the power of this whole body to transform the state capitol where the offices are possibly going to be built or have been requested to be built on second floor. Now could you do that without coming to this floor.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I think the only way you can do that is to have this body change the law which sets up the building commission which apparently gives them the final say so as to what this Legislature does in the acquiring of any space in the capitol as it now exists or might exist.

SENATOR BARNETT: I don't actually read it that way, Senator Carpenter, and I hope that

SENATOR CARPENTER: We can't change--at least I don't think--we can change the laws that now exist within the building commission.

SENATOR BARNETT: Well then, if we can't do that, I don't know what we'd need these amendments for.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well then, do you want to move to strike the whole amendment out. I don't care.

SENATOR BARNETT: No, I'm not--at the present time, I'm trying to figure out whether we need the second amendment or the last part of it. I'll probably be one of those mice that you talk about and I'll probably vote against this for several reasons but not the intent. It's the way it was done. I would still like to see a public hearing on this bill.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, do you want a public hearing.

SPEAKER: We are actually still--

SENATOR BARNETT: Yes, I would. I'd like to--

SENATOR CARPENTER: Why don't you move to have a public hearing? I don't object to public hearing.

SENATOR BARNETT: Ok, I move to have a public hearing on LB 204.

SPEAKER: Well, hold on. There are several other motions pending here. This is a unanimous consent motion by Senator Carpenter. Let me ask this, are there any objections to Senator Carpenter's motion because if there is, then this stops this particular motion at this time and there doesn't need to be any more debate on it. We have three other motions pertaining to this bill on the clerk's desk at this time. Once again, Senator Carpenter's motion is unanimous consent. Is there anyone that objects to this motion as it appears on Page 196 of the Journal.

SENATOR BARNETT: I don't understand that at all. Are we -- I'm objecting to the amendments, yes.

SPEAKER: Fine, then that stops the debate on it right now and that settles it and the unanimous consent motion is lost. We move then to the motions that are on the desk.

CLERK: Read.

SPEAKER: Ok. The chair recognizes Senator Snyder.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President, members of the body, I hate to see this haggling continue. We've been over this several times. I don't really know how much can be said by any member of this body at this time to add any more enlightenment. I think the
