SPEAKER: Now Senator Proud is next to speak, do you want to yield the floor Senator Proud to Senator Snyder, actually you're yielding your position there.

SENATOR PROUD: No I don't think so.

SENATOR PROUD: Senator Snyder can follow me if he wants to. If he feels real strong about it I'll yield to him. I don't think any more talk really, and I, everybody should talk at once, cause I don't think any talk's going to make any difference, I would like to ask a question of Governor Chambers, I hope he is not offended by that title -

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No Senator Proud I'll your quick question with a quick answer.

SENATOR PROUD: And then I'd like to make a short statement.

SENATOR PROUD: This, your bill does provide for twelve districts right,
