As I said, we hope that Senator Marvel would be here and we could consider the overall, but, in the meantime, we want this body to make the determination upon what you want to accept our recommendations. Now in our Committee on these pens, there was some division of opinion. I think two or three senators were not in agreement with this motion and they are now able, if they want to, to make whatever statement they want toward the motion. But we are trying to let you participate, not only in the responsibility, but the reaction to things of a small nature because that's the thing people generally understand. You get down to the level of the understanding of the problem, then you get immediate reaction. If we brought a bill in here to spend \$10,000,000, probably nobody outside of this body would be interested in it because, understandably, they wouldn't probably understand it. This they understand and this we want to share with you our responsibility. I move for the adoption of the motion.
