SPEAKER: Senator Nore, did you wish to be heard on this issue?

SENATOR NORE: I want to point a personal privilege.

SPEAKER: State your point, Senator.

SENATOR NORE: I think that, Mr. Speaker and fellow members, I think that Senator Warner has a good point. Now, this morning when I asked for a personal privilege, I know that I could have said that I move we indefinitely postpone and go ahead and then recall my motion. I knew that I could do that, but it takes too much time. We might have had half of the people up on the floor when you do these things. So, that's what is taking our time. SPEAKER: Thank you, Senator Nore. The chair recognizes Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, a few moments ago when Senator Carpenter said to Senator Cavanaugh, "You can go to the men's lounge and nobody will miss you," I want to challenge that statement. I want Senator Cavanaugh to know that I will miss him and several senators have come to me since that statement was made and said they would miss him too and I feel that such caustic remarks in this body is completely uncalled for.

SENATOR DUIS: The first one, I think your Rule 7, Section 5, page 38 should be taken up first.

CLERK: OK. That's on page 234 of the Legislative Journal.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would hope that you would turn to page 234 so that you might see this rule change. I'll do my very best to go through it in a manner that won't take too long. It is a rather lengthy one. Tell me, whenever you are ready. Are you ready now?
