Have you all voted? The Clerk will record. Senator Carpenter has called for a call of the house. Does the Chair see five hands?

SENATOR CARPENTER: It will be the last time we can do it.

SPEAKER: Thank you. The Clerk will clear the board, Senator Carpenter has asked for a call of the house, clear the board. At the next bell please indicate your presence. We are under the call of the house Senator Anderson, please take your seat, Senator Warner please take your seat. CLERK: 38 ayes to raise the call Mr. President.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 5 nays, 16 not voting, correction 6 nays, 14 not voting.

SPEAKER: Thank you, the rule change is adopted, back to you Senator Duis.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next rule change is an amendment to rule 7, section 9, page 40 of the rules as found on page 235 of the legislative journal.

SENATOR DUIS: Mr. President and members of the legislature, if you might turn to page 40 of your rule book, I think you might be able to follow this a little more closely than you might from the journal. This particular rule change has to do with the motion to adjourn.
