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to cooperate or refuse to let someone into their place of business that they would ever be taken to court but many individuals now know this so do not cooperate.

SENATOR WARNER: But it would be true that the Commission would not have..

SENATOR MARSH: The Commission would not take them to court. This would be through the County Attorney.

SENATOR WARNER: And the Commission would not have any authority to act as a court to assess..

SENATOR MARSH: That is true.

SENATOR WARNER: Thank You.

SENATOR MARSH: The Commission does not have the authority to act as a court.

SPEAKER: Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: First, I want to ask Senator Marsh a question.

SENATOR MARSH: Yes, sir.

SENATOR SYAS: When you keep in this..Page 12..3 and you keep talking about facility, like on gasoline stations and all that, you are talking about lavatories, is that what you are talking about?

SENATOR MARSH: Yes.

SENATOR SYAS: Well now, on a cafeteria or lunch room, in many cases they don't have any.

SENATOR MARSH: I beg your pardon sir. I believe every place of public food service is required to have a bathroom. It does not mean they must have two. It means they may have a bathroom with a lock on the door.

SENATOR SYAS: Oh, a lock on the door. Well, that does a lot of good. The reason I brought this up is because we've been kicking around for several years and this is one of my pet gripes is that we do not require restaurants to have this facility for the general public and it just gripes me no end and that the state doesn't have health, strict health laws on things of that nature.

SENATOR MARSH: Then I stand corrected, if this is true. My understanding was that a place of public food was required to have a bathroom facility, for their employees and the public.

SENATOR SYAS: They may in the big cities, let us put it that way. They have them but you don't have the use of them in many cases. Anyhow, I want to get on to one other little thing. To Senator Barnett, I wish to say that since he brought up the sheriff and that you had on an application he thought was discriminatory because you had to put down Republican or Democrat. That's not discriminatory, Senator. That's partisanship and when you make that a part of this Legislature, you are going to have that right down the line. All employees are going to be with the majority party. All chairmen are going to be with the majority party. Let's not kid anybody. That is partisanship. That's not discriminatory.

SPEAKER: Senator Kelly.

SENATOR KELLY: That's a hard act to follow. Mr. Chairman, members of the body, the Labor Committee did labor over this proposition presented by the administrator of the Equal
