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are concerned, most of them are very competent people. However, too often, they are quite carefully selected by the school administration when they run for office, in your little towns and your metropolitan cities and all classes of cities. We must have this five year roadblock.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the Carpenter amendment? The chair recognizes Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. President, I was up to speak yesterday on it and since Senator Carpenter is taking the liberty of letting Class 3 school districts come back in..not trying to take them out and bringing it to twenty years or no amount of years, I'm definitely in favor of this. Let me tell you a little something about Sarpy County that is a little unique from the rest of us. We have a new district that is going in. A new town and Mike Hogan is going to develop it. It will have 6,000 people in it. It can't be annexed by any of the other cities and it will be in the Papillion School district and there is no way that Papillion can build a school in that town, pay for it, and hold classes. There is no way they can transport them from that place seven or eight miles west to Papillion Schools. They don't even have room for their children there. So this will allow a Sanitary Improvement district, a development to come in and many of them have asked to do this, to build a school and turn around and lease that school building to the school..to the school district. When it is paid for, turn it over to the school district. That is one of the finest things we have ever had unless we do some other way of financing education. I am surprised that Senator Nore is against this, but I certainly support this. I'd like to see it go through just like it is right now. Thank you.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Senator Keyes, will you yield to a question.

SPEAKER: Will you yield, Senator Keyes?

SENATOR DICKINSON: Why don't we have the Papillion School Board down here asking for this bill?

SENATOR KEYES: The Papillion School Board told me that they would like to have the permission to lease buildings.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Well, I wish they would tell the Committee and tell everybody, then. In response to the remarks about.. we continually remark about school boards, whether we trust them or whether we do not, but I contend without having taken a poll of Nebraska school boards that and having served on school boards a few times in my life that they do not want this respons..a majority of Nebraska school boards do not want this responsibility. They are perfectly willing to be obliged to sell their needs to the people and they simply don't want to be blessed with this responsibility to have..to then be pressured possibility from an administrators or from pressure groups to do something on their own without asking or answering to the people. I am opposed to this amendment.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the amendment? Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Nothing except the fact that there is probably only one or two school districts in the state that face the same possibility that Papillion does. They called me the other night and said that their mill levy was going to 115 mills and that doesn't take in the town that is going to be developed. They call it the "town". Now, I don't know what it is going to be. When that little area comes in with about five or six thousand people, then the mill levy would probably go to 135 or 140. Papillion has informed me that they are going to levy
