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that as I hear Senator Goodrich talking about his bill, as I read this bill, what we are talking about is areas of cities or areas of small towns, small villages, that pay no property tax at all, simply because nobody, they've got run down buildings, broken down, nobody occupies them, nobody uses them, nobody is paying any tax on them at all, and so if an exemption was granted, even a partial exemption, you probably would end up collecting more tax than was being paid on the buildings in the first place, so I think the, maybe this particular bill, the way it is written now, is not the precise answer we need, but I think the thing we need to be looking at here, is what can we in Nebraska do, to encourage our cities our villages, and our small dying towns in the rural areas to take some of these down town areas for example, in the dying towns that we have out in rural Nebraska, and redevelop these towns, tear out some of these abandon buildings, that nobody is using now, nobody is paying any taxes on. We need to see if there is a courageous way that we can encourage the redevelopment of these towns, and I think that perhaps this bill is not the whole answer but I think it deserves a serious look in that light.

SPEAKER: The Chair next recognizes Senator Carpenter. Senator Carpenter we are talking on the motion to indefinitely postpone LB 72. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well I just move the previous question, I think we have had all the good, I didn't intend to do that, but I will.

SPEAKER: I'm sorry I didn't catch you, did you -

SENATOR CARPENTER: I move the previous question, let's take a vote on the motion to indefinitely postpone.

SPEAKER: The previous question has been moved, does the chair see five hands. Senator Carpenter, it seems that in fairness that we allow Senator Goodrich to respond to the motion to indefinitely postpone, in that he has not had a chance at all to speak against this motion.

SENATOR CARPENTER: I presume he has that -

SPEAKER: Pardon Me Senator?

SENATOR CARPENTER: I have no desire to give him time to respond.

SPEAKER: Well I think the Chair would like -

SENATOR CARPENTER: Then I'll make the motion, unless somebody objects, after the Senator has responded, then I'll offer the motion.

SPEAKER: Very good. Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, and members of the body, first of all obviously there is a lot of confusion on the floor, relative to this bill. There is a lot of debate been carried on so far relative not to this bill, but to what we might be able to do in the future. Some of the comments for example have been designated, directed rather to what we would be doing in the future if this constitutional amendment passed. I have no objection whatsoever to restricting this to residential areas, that's all that we intend for it to do anyhow, consequently we could insert a restriction in this bill, restricting it to residential areas, as far as killing this bill is concerned, we can do that, we can do it very easily today, but who is going to do anything about the residential areas in the not just blighted areas in Omaha, but the blighted areas across the state of Nebraska. We keep saying somebody ought to do something
