

SENATOR STAMMER: Mr. President and Members of the body. I would like to say that I would not necessarily oppose the 10 days but I think the problem was that many committees, especially interim study committees, did not get their bills in and it was questionable whether these study committees put in certain legislation. I had two or three items I was interested in and it was only after about 10 or 15 or in some cases, 20 days before the committees got their bills in and how are we to be mind readers to know whether or not these committees are going to get their bills in so that we can take care of it if they don't. I think if we were to adopt this 10 bill or 10 day limit we ought to insist that the standing, or special committees, have their bills drafted and ready for adoption the first day we get down here and if we don't like it or we think they haven't covered something important, then we have an opportunity to step forward and put in a bill but I, I feel at a loss as an individual Senator in not knowing what the committees are going to do.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussions? If not, are you ready for the questions? Does everybody understand the question? Everybody understanding the question, the question is, shall we change the rules in accordance with the motion. This requires 30 votes. All those in favor vote aye. Those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Clerk will record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 10 nays, 7 not voting, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: The rule change is adopted. Are there further rule changes? Senator Duis.

CLERK: Mr. President, there is an amendment to Rule 5, Section 6g.
