SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President I have an amendment to the amendment there, would the Clerk read the amendment.

SPEAKER: Read the amendment.

CLERK: Amendment read.

SPEAKER: We have now under consideration that amendment, Senator Whitney.

SENATOR WHITNEY: The reason we are deleting undeveloped land is that I think there would be great difficulty in defining what is meant by undeveloped land, not only that, but there might be some development on that land, and it would prevent any school district in the state from buying any land that had any development whatsoever on the land, if these words are left in, so I wish to have these words deleted, I think it would meet with the approval of the introducer of the bill, Senator Goodrich, and would Senator Goodrich yield to that question, would this be approved by you Senator Goodrich?

SPEAKER: Senator Goodrich do you yield?

SENATOR GOODRICH: I would suggest that we actually determine the size only, and let it go at that because anything else will lead us right into the courts.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Well that's what this amendment does, is to delete the word undeveloped, so that this would leave as the amendment then that you have the privilege of buying forty acres instead of twenty five, and that's what this amendment would do, it would be to delete undeveloped acres.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Right I would support that and I would support the amendment as amended.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion of the Whitney amendment to the amendment, Senator Dickinson did you wish to be heard on this? Senator Dickinson.

SENATOR DICKINSON: I'm willing to support Senator Whitney's amendment to my amendment, I think this is fine. I also like to comment to some other comments that were made. Mainly Senator Stahmer's. In the first place we are talking about land, Senator Stahmer that can be obtained by eminent domain, and this does not mean the district can go out and buy one hundred and sixty acres of land by eminent domain and resell it, I'm sure that they can only buy what they can justify to a court that they need, and your comments on the wealth of districts, this is another subject all together and shouldn't be considered in this one, because it's, there are certainly different definitions of wealth and land land or property is certainly not the only definition of wealth. Now we are not introducing new legislation here, by the way in answer to Senator Syas, this hasn't been mentioned I guess it isn't important but my name was also on the bill as a co-introducer, Senator Syas, so, and I do represent one suburban district at least and part of another one. We are not introducing new legislation and as it stands now we are simply increasing the need, the land that a school district can take, from twenty five to forty acres and I think this is reasonable in some areas, and again I reiterate that any school district doing this must justify their needs, so we have to have some faith in those people who will make this ultimate decision. So I support the amendment, Senator Whitney.

SPEAKER: Senator Syas the Chair is trying to dispose of the amendment to the amendment, this is the Whitney amendment, do you want to speak on that, Senator Syas.
