SPEAKER: Well Senator do I interpret your remarks to mean that you're objecting to the printing of the letter in the journal?

SENATOR NORE: Yes I am, I think it's a proabaganda.

SPEAKER: Okay. Senator Proud, Senator Nore has objected to the printing of the letter in the journal, and I don't know that the Chair has ever had a situation like this before, but I presume that if the body so desires I suppose that it could go to a vote.

SPEAKER: Alright the motion is that the document be printed in the journal, and that's the issue before us at this particular time, we have that motion before the house and that is the communication which the Clerk read from the Department of Agriculture and from the President's office will be entered in the journal, the Chair recognizes Senator Nore.

SENATOR NORE: I would like to oppose this motion, for the simple reason I think the operations of the Department of Agriculture concerning the farmers of the state of Nebraska, is completely incompetent, calling four years of crops, we have a shortage of fuel, we have shortage of cars, it just completely incompetent, their operation. It's almost ridiculous what they are doing.

SPEAKER: Okay, the Chair recognizes Senator Luedtke, then Senator Syas, Waldron, Whitney.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Welcome to the day after St. Valentine's.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, this is just proving what I've been saying all along about our sending resolutions all over the country. The minute you start sending resolutions to somebody you put them on the defensive and they answer with their pro-aganda. Now this is what we asked for, we got their answer, we debate with one another here we don't agree with one another, and they're just giving you their side of the questions. You want to send them these kind of communications, expect to get something back, or tell them that you don't want any answer when you send them what you're telling them to do. I still say again, if a person wants to run for Congress, you ought to run for Congress
