proper motion would be, perhaps, first off Senator Kime is asking unanimous consent...Excuse me. That's right. The first motion would be to have Frank Lewis' name placed on the bill. Are there objections to having his name placed on the bill? Now, Senator Dickinson, do you object.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Well, do we have a right to an explanation as to why this is taking place, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER: Well, it's not really debatable. It's just a matter of putting names on here and maybe he can explain this to you. I suppose...OK. Are there objections to Senator Lewis placing his name on the bill. Any objections. Hearing none. So ordered. Now, Senator Kime is asking unanimous consent that his name be taken off of the bill. Are there objections to the removal of Senator Kime's name. Any objections? Hearing none. That is so ordered, then.

CLERK: Mr. President. Read.

SPEAKER: Senator Snyder asking to be excused Friday. Are there any objections. There are none. So ordered.

CLERK: That is all, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: We are down to the consideration of bills on Select File.

CLERK: Mr. President. Read.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Epke.

SENATOR EPKE: Mr. President and fellow members, this bill was bracketed until the 21st. I will be absent on the 21st so that is the reason I've asked to unbracket it this morning. This bill was discussed some yesterday and in the discussion why we had so much objection to the way the bill was written. They felt like it was a little too broad. The arresting powers that we were giving the Department of Agriculture covered more than what some of them felt it should so with the amendment I feel like I've accomplished what the objections were against. Will the clerk read the amendment?

SPEAKER: Are there objections to unbracketing the bill? There are none. So ordered. The bill is unbracketed. The clerk will read the amendment.

CLERK: Read.

SENATOR EPKE: I feel that this amendment..it spells out specifically what they intend to do with this law. It pretty well ties it down to where it pertains to livestock only and primarily in the control of animal disease and also in controlling theft of livestock. I would ask that this be added to the bill.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion of Senator Epke's amendment. All those in favor of the amendment say aye. Those opposed say no. So ordered. The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Now, Mr. President, there are apparently no further amendments. I thought there were.

SPEAKER: You have no other amendment.

SENATOR EPKE: The other amendment is on the "A" bill.

CLERK: OK. There are no further amendments, Mr. President. All other amendments have been disposed of that were attached to the bill
