SPEAKER: Are there any corrections from the floor? Hearing none, so ordered. The journal will stand as corrected.

CLERK: Communications from the Governor (read).

SPEAKER: Are there other communications on the desk?

CLERK: Not communications, but committee reports.

SPEAKER: Read the reports.

CLERK: (read). That's all Mr. President.

SPEAKER: Do we have, are there any resolutions?

CLERK: None.

SPEAKER: Excuse me we had better move to final reading, we have one, two, three, four, bills on final reading, but if could begin to get the Senators in their seats and clear the floor, we will take up the four bills on final reading, and while we are doing that the Chair would like the privilege of announcing the attendance this morning, we have eight girl scouts from troupe #139 and they are accompanied by two adults, and they are from Senator Murphy's area, South Sioux City and Dakota City, and their leader is Mrs. Robert (I think) it's Yusten, they are seated in the north balcony and we would like to have them stand up so we will make sure that we can see them, that's the time, very good, welcome to the Unicameral Legislature, now then in addition to the girl scouts, we also have some third, fourth and fifth grade students from Randolph Elementary School, their instructor is William Schernika, and they are from Senator Marsh's district, and if they would stand up, we would like to recognize them, very good, welcome to where the action is today.
