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that idea way beyond belief in my humble opinion. I urge that we postpone this bill.

SPEAKER: We have several that want to speak. Senator Stahmer, Senator Marsh, Chambers and Nore. Senator Stahmer.

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, I'd like to ask Senator DeCamp a question if he would yield.

SPEAKER: Senator DeCamp, will you yield, please?

SENATOR STAHMER: Senator DeCamp, would you yield to a question, please? Did I understand you correctly, sir, that you are opposed to the Chambers' version of this bill and that you think that windows look dirty from certain places and they look clean from other places, or words to that affect.

SENATOR DECAMP: No, no. Sorry, Senator Stahmer, you've misinterpreted. I'll put it real simple. The windows look dirty from both vantage points, but we are cleaning them now pretty effectively and if you have evidence to show otherwise, then possibly I can discuss it but, thus far, no evidence was presented in Committee, on this floor, to show that our windows are as dirty as you apparently think or that your solution will really clean them.

SENATOR STAHMER: Well, Senator DeCamp, let me ask you another question, if I may. Did you support Senator Chambers in LB 12 in the Omaha school district, I mean Omaha school board, correction, City Council bill.

SENATOR DECAMP: No, I did not support Senator Chambers in that. I did vote for the bill.

SENATOR STAHMER: Yes. Well, it would appear to me that sometimes when rural Senators think they are liberal for Omaha, they suddenly become conservative when they...when it comes to voting for western Nebraska. Is this a possibility?

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, maybe...

SENATOR STAHMER: Some of us like to be consistent in either being liberal or conservative.

SENATOR DECAMP: Why, if you want to discuss my position on this particular bill 184, I'd be happy to. If you want to discuss my position on LB 12, I'd be happy to. The two are not consistent with each other and pick which one you want to talk about and we'll go with it.

SENATOR STAHMER: They certainly are not consistent if you take one stand on one bill and take the opposite stand on another bill. I agree with you. Thank you.

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, possibly the inability of you to interpret a particular individual's decision on a bill doesn't render that position inconsistent.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: I'd like to make the imput that those who hire household workers now go through the paper work of doing the social security. It seems to me it would be very little more to also include this. It's the same category. Since it is \$50.00 in a three months period, this is certainly a small enough amount...this is certainly a large enough amount that it would, in most instances, take care of the baby sitting on a casual bases. Only the regular baby sitting if families, if both parents were working or a one-parent family were working, would it not be taken care of and I am against the kill motion. Thank you.
