We have to lock the doors in the school there or they will send them to school 7 or 7 o'clock in the morning. I think this is a great opportunity to abdicate that parent responsibility to the school and the next thing will be hostels for the children where they will lose them, probably, for from the time they are in their four year olds, probably, until they are out of high school or even college. The parent won't get to see them at all.
