SENATOR HASEBROOCK: Chair, President and Members of the Legislature, just in the last two years we did put out a list of non-controversial bills which were non-controversial bills in the judgment of the speaker and they were passed out to the members of the Legislature either on Thursday or Friday or whatever they decided and it would work about the same way as this is suggested here so I, I think it's a good idea to do this but I also think there is some danger in it, but I think it will implement the moving ahead and this is the thing that we must bear in mind. We should make some progress.

SPEAKER: Thank you Senator Hasebroock. Chair next recognizes Senator Kelly. For what purpose do you rise, Senator?

SENATOR KELLY: Mr. President and Members of the body, I rise on a point of personal privilege.

SPEAKER: State your point, Senator.

SENATOR KELLY: To compliment and thank Senator Chambers, the chairman of the Governmental Affairs Committee, Senator Wally Barnett, the vice chairman of the Governmental Affairs Committee, every member of that committee, everybody that testified for and against L.R. 9 for the marvelous conduct that everybody showed in this hearing. We've heard now for many days and many years the prestige of this Legislature should be raised. With 2,000 people in this chamber, with very dedicated opinions on both sides of an explosive question, this committee, in my opinion, did more for the Legislature and the State of Nebraska than any one single thing I have ever seen and if it's within the ethics of this group, I do ask that we stand and applaud this committee. Is that possible?

SPEAKER: I think your remarks will suffice, Senator.

SENATOR KELLY: All right.

SPEAKER: Excellent. Your point is well taken. Chair recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: A point of personal privilege too.

SPEAKER: State your point.

SENATOR DUIS: Thank you Senator Kelly. I did want to make this remark. I would sincerely hope that through the, this particular meeting yesterday on the subject of this legislative resolution, I would hope that somewhere through the news media they would find out; if people could become as much interested in our tax problems, I am sure that the Budget Committee sat downstairs yesterday on a 500 million dollar budget probably working real hard and I'm also interested in mentally retarded and handicapped children and such as that because we certainly need help in all respects not just something that becomes emotional and I'm not taking a thing away from the resolution and how it may have been handled but we did have great enthusiasm and I sure wish we could get it for other things so I do hope this brings out this point a little bit too.
