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interested in and also being considered on the National level? Would you, in other words, I'm just asking you in your opinion, if everybody in the body understood your amendment, would it be controversial?

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, I did my best to make them understand it.

SENATOR PROUD: Well, I, I'm not going to object at this time to see if somebody else does.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, I have no objection, Senator, if you want to--

SENATOR PROUD: Well, I, I don't want to get in your hair just to be getting in your hair, but we're supposed to be taking up non-controversial bills and if this amendment of yours is controversial, if the savings and loans are very interested in it and want it and other parties don't want it, then I don't feel it should be taken up this morning. I'm just asking you in your best judgment whether or not it is in fact controversial.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well, I would certainly not be able to say anything else, but I was honest with this body as to what the intent of the thing was. Now let me say to be perfectly clear, there has not been a single building and loan or anyone interested in one, director or otherwise, who asked me to do this. Now, I'll be further plain with this body that I was responsible because of the delay on Senator Johnson's bill for it not becoming law a year or so ago and then it got to a point where because the banks became involved, they were somewhat separated among themselves. The larger banks, I don't think, had any objection to it. Some of the small banks did, but I couldn't stand here and say truthfully that this is not a controversial bill. It's only controversial if somebody here thinks it is and of course I think it is, but if nobody wants to object to it, I'd be the last one in the world who would object to it. I, I never want to be in the position of this body of not telling you exactly what I'm trying to do and I have. Now if Senator Proud believes, and I have no objection, but let's hold it over until Monday and I don't want to get in Senator Luedtke's hair either so I don't think a day or so will make any difference. Let's see what the reaction might be.

SPEAKER: All right. Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp, then we have Murphy, Kelly.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. I certainly don't want to get in Senator Carpenter's hair either so I would go along with his recommendation and request to lay it over until Monday. Is that okay? And have it printed in the Journal, I'd kind of like to look it over.

SPEAKER: The Chair wants to compliment you for being so congenial this morning and I think that from the remarks here, Senator Luedtke, do you--

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I want to be congenial too, taken, Senator Carpenter has taken the non-controversial bill and made a controversial bill out of it with this amendment so I certainly think it ought to be put over till Monday.

SPEAKER: You're laying the bill over until Monday, okay, we'll lay over L.B.--are there objections to laying over L.B. 351 until Monday. Senator Kelly and Murphy, I'd presume that you wanted to make about the same remarks. We're going to lay the bill over until Monday with that amendment. Senator Kelly, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR KELLY: My request would be that 2 hours from now is Monday. I would rather see it Tuesday or Wednesday.
