SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Cavanaugh. We really are still speaking on the Carpenter amendment, to LB 339.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Yes, I's just like to say that I think Senator Carpenter and Senator DeCamp have demonstrated the great necessity for this type of legislation, it provides for better and, to insure really the discretion of these officials and I move the adoption of the Carpenter amendment and the bill.

SPEAKER: Very good. The Chair recognizes Senator Dickinson. Then Senator Maresh.

SENATOR DICKINSON: Mr. President and members of the body, I rise to oppose Senator Carpenter's amendment. I feel and in accord with these people talking about, and Senator Cavanaugh, I believe was just referring to elected persons that this bill does cover, and perhaps shall would be a good word for them. I think to carry it down to all employees of any governmental subdivision should be left as a negotiable item, this is one of the things that employees negotiate with their employers about and putting shall in here would eliminate that altogether and I therefore oppose this amendment.

SPEAKER: Senator Maresh. We have the Carpenter amendmert.

SENATOR MARESH: Mr. President and members of the legislature I would like to ask a question of Senator Luedtke, if he will yield?

SPEAKER: Senator Luedtke will you yield to a question?

SENATOR MARESH: Does this cover appointed welfare directors in the counties?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: No. Of course not.

SENATOR MARESH: I had a letter from a welfare director in my county and he is concerned about being brought into law suits, I have a letter from former Senator Arnold Runke and he says that probably we could provide
