they say, what do we do now, we have a public defender law on the books, which we put on several years ago, but which we have never, never funded. This will now take a whole new approach to the field of public defender, make setting it up in Judicial districts, setting up a state public defender to coordinate and to administer, the public defender law. This was studied by various sections of the Nebraska Bar Association, by our committee, and by the Judicial Council and this is the recommendation they came up with. Then the last one is to eliminate a specific corporate officers upon whom summons may be served, this should have been caught actually by some of our laws that were introduced at the beginning of the session, when we were cleaning up bills and stating where officers can serve summons in civil cases, because it is just a thing that is not found in the county as opposed to the state, then service can be had by leaving it at the last known place of business. Let me clarify where a sheriff, a deputy sheriff can leave a summons in such a contingency. This was never done in the law and it should have been in there, so that is a rather, it's just a change from the standpoint of that procedure to help the deputy sheriff.

SPEAKER: Now Senator Luedtke were these five bills.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Five bills, yes.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion about the introduction of these bills, the motion is to introduce the bills, we would require 30 votes. Any discussion, Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: I just want to ask Senator Luedtke a question. Senator Luedtke in your opening you said on that first one, that we are going to take the rules and regulations of the Federal Government and put them in statute, is that right?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: No, I did not.

SENATOR KEYES: Well state over again what you said on the first statement.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: The Federal rules of criminal procedure, which had been adopted by the Federal Court -

SENATOR KEYES: They're not statute are they, they are not law in Washington D. C. are they?

SENATOR LUEDTKE: They are not -

SENATOR KEYES: They are just politics.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: The Federal rules are the rules that are adapted for Federal courts in this country.

SENATOR KEYES: All I want to say is -

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Here in Lin -

SENATOR KEYES: Once again we are going to make Federal rules and regulations in statute in Nebraska.

SPEAKER: Now are you ready for the question? The question is, shall these bills be introduced, all those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. It requires 30 votes. Have you all voted? I'll hold the board open a little bit, Senator Luedtke. This motion to introduce the bills requires 30 votes. They are five bills as Senator Luedtke has explained. Yes Senator Chambers.
