is a bad thing to do, however, we have done it, we have LB 112 in pretty good shape, basically the way this probably should be approached is to take the accommodation section of 29 in the Civil Rights Law and rewrite the designations for discrimination in public places, there are rules and regulations under which the equal housing act work and they are a part of that section of the law, and many of those same procedures are effecting the public accommodation section, but this is not the route that was taken. The route is to write a new section for public accommodations and put the rules and regulations for operating in there, and repealing the section 111 which is the operating procedures of the whole commission. Now this is mixed up and I'm real concerned about trying to write these complicated bills on the floor, as we talked about in the first day when we raised it from committee. Now what we have now probably is something that doesn't satisfy either side, but I urge that we pass LB 112, because we do have a lot of problems in this discrimination area, and the individuals that are discriminated against are in many times, unable to do something about it themselves, but I'm sure that we'll be back with this again next session. So let's pass LB 112 and get it on it's way.
