that he is asking unanimous consent. This Resolution is going to be voted upon at this particular time. At least, that's the chair's understanding. Senator Cavanaugh, anything further. Very good. The question is shall... Senator Stull, did you wish to be heard on the Resolution?

SENATOR STULL: I'd just like to ask Senator Cavanaugh one question.

SPEAKER: Senator Cavanaugh, will you yield to a question?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: Yes. I yield.

SENATOR STULL: What is this property really worth that the mortgage is on?

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: I'm afraid I don't know, Senator Stull.

SENATOR STULL: Is it worth more than the \$3,000.

SENATOR CAVANAUGH: The mortgage wasn't worth more than that. The mortgage was worth about...I don't know. The mortgage as I originally...the original mortgage was worth... was for somewhere in the neighborhood of \$5,000.

SENATOR STULL: Thank you.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the Resolution? The question is shall Resolution #16 be adopted. All those in favor vote aye. Those opposed vote no. Voting on the adoption of Resolution #16 as explained by Senator Cavanaugh. Have you all voted? The clerk will record.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 0 nays...voting aye. 34 ayes...do you want to take Senator Anderson's vote.

SPEAKER: Yes, I'll take it.

CLERK: 34 ayes, Mr. President, 0 nays, 15 not voting.

SPEAKER: The Resolution is adopted. Do we have any other Resolutions on the desk?

CLERK: None that want to be taken up.

SPEAKER: Do we have any bills for introduction?

CLERK: Yes.

CLERK: Read motion.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Kennedy.

SENATOR KENNEDY: Mr. President and fellow members, again our Committee has offered this bill for introduction. I think it does give us an opportunity. The License Board since 1954 has not had a change in fees and they have a defect in their budget now of \$38,000 and we would like to have a public hearing on this. So, this would be the reason for the introduction. It also would coordinate the fee all under the same statute. I would ask for the introduction of this bill.

SPEAKER: Any further discussion of the motion. The question is shall the bill be introduced. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. Voting on the introduction of the bill as explained by Senator Kennedy. It takes 30 votes. Have you all voted? The clerk will record.

CLERK: 32 ayes, Mr. President, on the introduction of the bill.

SPEAKER: The bill is introduced. Do you want to read the title.
