SENATOR CHAMBERS: He said that before any amendment, he said that if the bill passed he would sign it, he said if it was amended, the first time, he would sign it, and now he says if it's amended this time he will sign it.

SENATOR BARNETT: He told you that he will sign it, if these amendments are added.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR BARNETT: Okay that's all I want to know.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Goodrich.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Would, Mr. President and members of the body, would Senator Chambers yield to another question please?

SPEAKER: Senator Chambers will you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.
