I got 194 coming up and I don't suppose this is going to help it any. Now, the rationing of gasoline was referred to, I think it is possible, I hate to see it, but if it does come, your going to force in the cities many people to quite driving cars, and your going to throw such a load on the city transient system, that if that ever happens which I hope it never does, we would be in such financial straits that I don't know what the cities would do. Senator Nore says well AMTRAK is taking care of em, I'm not talking about AMTRAK, I'm not talking, in fact I don't see where any AMTRAK is anything to raise a flag about, we've got less transportation now out of AMTRAK then we did when the Railroads ran it, but AMTRAK goes all away across the United States, it doesn't, built for Omaha, or Grand Island, or anything like that. I said it wasn't built for Omaha or Grand Island, I know you don't have it at Grand Island. It goes through the Burlington, in Omaha, I mean in Nebraska, mostly, it goes through the Burlington lines and then switches to the U.P., but I don't see where that has anything to do with what I'm talking about. I'm talking about only one thing, and it, the whole debate got off the track, I'm not telling you to take a position on, transient systems at all. All I want you to do on this thing is remain silent about, don't say anything one way or the other, that's why I just say do away with section 3, don't mention it and then they can, the resolution, those that receive it can do what they want to do, but we are not taking a stand on the thing, we just remain silent. That's all, I'm not taking, expecting you to take a stand for or against the city transient systems today, all I want you, all I'm asking you to do by my amendment is to just don't say anything about it, but it's coming, regardless what you do today, Lincoln's already has a city owned, Omaha has gone to city owned, Grand Island is on the horizon, and I was surprised that Senator Kelly didn't get in this someplace because they are beginning to get the problem on theirs and, so this is going to be coming and what we do today of course, won't necessarily stop from what will happen in the future, but I just rather see you remain silent on the, on section 3 and not say anything.

SPEAKER: Senator Syas' motion is to strike paragraph 3, and number 4 be numbered as number 3, all those in favor of that motion will vote aye, all those opposed will vote no. Your voting on Senator Syas' motion to strike paragraph 3 of Legislative Resolution #13, and renumber section 4. Have you all voted? The Clerk will record.

CLERK: 17 ayes, 19 nays, remainder not voting.

SPEAKER: The motion is lost. We are back to Senator Hasebroock and the original legislative resolution. Senator Hasebroock.

SENATOR HASEBROOCK: Mr. President, members of the legislature, I move that the resolution be adopted, I think we have discussed it in all manners, shapes and forms, I just move that it be adopted.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion of the resolution. Senator Snyder did you wish to be heard on the issue?

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President and members of the body, with all due respect to Senator Hasebroock of course, and to those of you who voted against Senator Syas proposed amendment, I think this would be a good time for some of those who represent the urban areas to say we have had enough, we have worked on several issues, to give the outstate people not only fair treatment, but I think many times already this session here on general file on this floor better than equal treatment, and I for one and I hate to use this type of terms, and Senator Syas probably said about the same thing in a nicer way, but when you left this thing in this resolution
