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lature and Senator Carpenter is always blunt enough to put the issue right where it is to appear in the eyes of the people to be taking a certain position whether they morally agree with it or not, whether they feel it's legally defensible or not. They are grandstanding and playing for the audience. This bill that I'm offering is designed to eliminate obsolete matter from the statute. Nobody has successfully refuted the contention that I have made. The Attorney General who favored the death penalty, I repeat again is in favor of this being done, and he said in his article which probably you have not read and probably won't read that he wants this done soon. He wants this bill passed soon. The bill ought not be bracketed. It ought to be advanced. So, I hope you defeat Senator Rasmussen's motion to bracket. Then, I will make another motion.

SPEAKER: The chair next recognizes Senator Stull.

SENATOR STULL: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I think Senator Rasmussen's request is valid. Now the.. Senator Chambers' bill repeals 28-401 and 28-417. LB 268 amends those sections. So, if you repeal or go ahead and pass the Senator Chambers bill, then it puts Senator Rasmussen's bill in the position that he would have to go back and have his bill redrafted. It would actually add some statutes to the repealed previously.

SPEAKER: Are you all through speaking on Senator Rasmussen's motion to bracket the bill. I have several lights left on. Senator Keyes, did you wish to be heard? All right. Senator Rasmussen...excuse me. Senator Stull just spoke. All right. Now, is there any further discussion of Senator Rasmussen's motion? Senator Luedtke. Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, why doesn't Senator Rasmussen move for a date certain for his bill to be brought up so we can bring these two together and get the issue decided. I think the Attorney General was sincere when he said he wanted the thing done quickly, as soon as possible, because they do have problems with this kidnapping statute. One way or another, we ought to take care of that problem. This was one way to do it. If Senator Rasmussen would just set a date, it's on General File now. It can be debated anytime you want to do it.

SPEAKER: Senator Rasmussen, what...do you care to respond?

SENATOR RASMUSSEN: At seventeen minutes of twelve, I don't think it would be the appropriate time, Mr. Speaker, but how about Monday. We will move 268, bracket them both on Monday.

SPEAKER: All right, Now, he's...Senator Rasmussen is asking unanimous consent to withdraw his motion to bracket the bill. Now, we are asking unanimous consent to put the two bill together to be argued Monday. Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President, I have a motion on the desk to have another bill bracketed for Monday. How about Tuesday?

SPEAKER: Here we go. Senator Rasmussen, do you care to respond to that? The request is to bracket till Tuesday, 268 and 146.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: I know. There is another one bracketed for Monday, too, which the one that I'm requesting to be bracketed for Monday would follow, so we already would have two, if we would get that done. So that would make the third one. So Tuesday would be better.

SPEAKER: Senator Rasmussen.
