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proposition that is new in Nebraska and I don't thoroughly understand all the implications of the bill. I didn't vote the first time around; however, in this instance I think that we ought to rely on Senator Fellman's word and the word of the committee members, particularly in an instance like this when the committee did hear the bill and they apparently all voted for it, but, but I'm sure if those against the bill were really against it strongly, they would have made personal contact with me so my advice for whatever it is worth, is that we should pass the bill.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Nore then Senator Luedtke. We're still talking on the motion to reconsider the action on L.B. 234.

SENATOR NORE: Mr. President and Members, I was one that supported L.B. 234 but I think we should note that this is sort of a bench mark example of what a few people who with selfish interests can do with a few letters and a few phone calls, etc. of killing a good bill.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Luedtke.

SENATOR LUEDTKE: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature, I would re-echo the same thing. I got one letter in opposition from some title company in Omaha. I have a very good friend in the title business in Lincoln that I checked with. He said there was no objection to the bill. I'll mention his name, it's Ray Frohn. He's very knowledgeable in this field, he's been on the Abstracting Board of the State of Nebraska. He's a present Secretary of that board. He found nothing. He sent it to various title companies throughout the country to have it checked. They found nothing wrong with it. I, I just cannot understand why one letter or a couple letters would allow us to kill a bill of this kind. I'm in favor of Senator Fellman's motion.

SPEAKER: Is there any further discussion now of the motion to reconsider the action on 234? Any further discussion? Are you all through discussing the motion? Senator Fell-- Senator Stahmer?

SENATOR STAHMER: Mr. President, who has made the motion for reconsideration?

SPEAKER: Senator Fellman has.

SENATOR STAHMER: Is that possible under the rules when he didn't vote on it originally.

SPEAKER: Yes sir.

SENATOR STAHMER: All right, thank you.

SPEAKER: Now, Senator Fellman. Senator Fellman is closing on his motion regarding reconsidering the action.

SENATOR FELLMAN: I think everything has been said about this bill and there is no need for further argument or discussion.

SPEAKER: All right, now, before we begin the action, I want you to understand what we're going to do. May I have your attention please? Senator Fellman has asked for reconsideration of the action on 234. That takes 30 votes to reconsider that action. After that action is reconsidered, then we will re-read the bill if he's successful in getting the 30 votes. That's
