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in to this in a small way. You can't get in to it to stop some unusual state boundaries or some gerrymandering or whatever you want to call it, I think if you get into it you have to do the whole thing, and I would suggest to Senator Carstens if he really wants to look at it totally and clearly, maybe the first prerequisite we do a state wide census at the expense of the legislature to start with and see where the population is and go from there. We're involved to some degree with growth in our area, but I am, I am willing to let it ride and instead of getting involved in the tremendous clash that this is going to bring out, I think that we have a recent redistricting, I think our people are used to who they are represented by now, to change back would add to the confusion, I agree with Senator Syas and I think the term he used is quite adequate when he said man this is going to open up a whole can of worms and I suggest to you that we give this a quick death.

SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes Senator Whitney, then Carpenter, then Nore, still speaking on -

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President and members of the legislature I'm going to have to oppose the suggestion to redistrict again, reapportioned the state legislature, I know last time Senator Waldron spent days, and days, in an attempt to do this, I know Senator Syas did up in Omaha, with his Senators there. We don't need, in my judgement to do this at the moment, we don't need to do it for two or three years. So why, require so much additional work here when we are pretty well situated now, I can't see any particular reason for it.

SPEAKER: Before the Chair recognizes Senator Carpenter, the Chair would like to introduce, seated in the north balcony here today, thirty nine fourth to eighth grade students from the Trumbull school at Trumbull, Nebraska, and just by chance they are from Senator Kremer's district, they have their instructors along, Mrs. Feeken and Mrs. Davidson, we are delighted to have you today as visitors to the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature. Now to continue debate on Senator Carstens motion we have Senator Carpenter. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well Mr. President, I my good friend Senator Syas, is using the same arguments against this bill as you did for the bill when we redistricted this legislature. But rather than get in a discussion about this, I think first we ought to find out what can we do, so I'd suggest to Senator Carstens and Senator Syas, both great constitutional lawyers that they go to the Attorney General and pose a question and write in to find out what we can do. I don't think we have to have another census the law before didn't require a census, it required estimates by the University of Nebraska and everybody else could think of a number. Now the whole point is, that we people out state we're undressed in our judgement, at least in mine, relative to the one man, one vote. The Supreme Court said now as I understand it, they didn't mean that, and irrespective to what Senator Syas they did the factor a sixteen percent in many cases. It may or may not apply to this, but the court of this state is not going to determine anything until they have a bill before us, and I would presume that Senator Syas would lead a group of people, if we passed the bill, into the court as he should to see whether we could do it or not. So we are only talking about whether we farmers want to take back what Senator Syas stole from us under the theory one man, one vote. My people out there think that a cow in order to serve our purpose, is just as important as a man is, they may be right or wrong, but we want to get back to the point where we were so that it won't happen when you get enough Senators you're going to undress us. That's what was said, just wait awhile, we get a few more Senators and we are going to show you what power is, and I want to prevent that, so I make a
