SENATOR ANDERSON: The, the effect of may, would be to, to allow the person acquiring the permit to transfer the a, transfer the permit from vehicle to vehicle, I assume. So this means that he has to affix this particular permit, to a vehicle.

SENATOR CARPENTER: But is says the Commission shall, he's sticken out may, shall require an entry permit to be fixed to the motor vehicle, but first you've gotta require the permit, and the rest of it only says where your gonna affix it. Now it seems to me that this thing is, has no discretion to it at all, and on a strict interpretation of the Bill as Amended, may be what we've been talking about is completely ineffective because the Law says they shall buy a permit. Then a, let me go on again and then I'll quit, and then we go on further for example, we go into line 16, and what are the areas. He says the permit area shall mean those areas or portions of the area of Nebraska, according to Section 81-81522, Sections 2, 3 and 4. Now what are they? Can I read from the law? A 2 says the State Parks shall mean Parks of substantial area, with the primary value of significance State-wide scenic, scientific and historical interest. Have a complete development potential and where possibly a representative force which can be retained in a natural, relatively undisturbed State. That's Section 2, which covers almost everything to begin with. Now this picks up the rest of it. Number 3, it requires, says State Recreational areas shall mean areas with a primary value for day use, but with secondary over-night use facilities or potential. Which have reasonable expansion, capabilities are located inaccordance with the sound park management principle, and then we go to Section 4, and it says, State Historical Park shall mean only sites which in the opinion of competant recognized authorities are of notable Historical significance to the State. Then we go to Section 5 says State way side inns, shall be areas appropriate in size and located at various intervals. Now it just seem to me, that the Law says, you shall get a permit. Maybe I'm wrong in these areas, and this doesn't leave anything to anybodys imagination, covers everything. Now the point I'm concerned about, at what point is this State going to stop charging it's citizens from going, having entry into what they think Public Parks. Now if you want to raise money, let's quite picking on pigeons. Let's tax those people today who are not paying anything really. Now I've got a hired girl who works for us for a long period of time. She likes to hunt and fish and if you pass this Bill, I'm going to lose her, because she goes fishing every week-end at Lake McConaughy, and addition to have a fishing license, she's gonna have to get a permit, and this doesn't exempt as I understand it, if I'm wrong, somebody tell me where I'm wrong, it doesn't exempt any park that this State has under the Fish and Game act. Every spective of the rules and regulation of the Law, says they shall have a permit in these 4 sections, 2, 3, 4, and 5. It doesn't give many discretion at all, but the think I'm concerned about, these people of moderate means, do not have access to these parks, without paying a fee. Of one dollar or five dollar, depending on the circumstances and if you think your not going to make alot of people mad, if your worried about coming back here, brother you really got a concern if you pass this Bill. Now lets quit again picking on pigeons. Let's get people that are, have the ability to pay, and make them pay, and let's have something in this State which is free, free. Where the average fella can go and sit down without having to pay some kind of admission to get in and sit down. In the second place, I
