

SPEAKER: All right. The previous question has been moved by Senator Lewis. Does the chair see five hands. Thank you. The question is shall the debate now close on LR 9. Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Well, the motion is to advance, is it not?

SPEAKER: No, to adopt. Motion is to adopt LR 9.

SENATOR PROUD: Well, it has to be treated as a bill, Mr. President.

SPEAKER: I'm sorry. I didn't hear your remark Senator Proud. Would you speak into the microphone?

SENATOR PROUD: The clerk may have something to say about this. It was my understanding that it needed to go across the Board, but if it doesn't. If it does not, that is quite all right with me.

UNIDENTIFIED: No, the moti...resolution does not need to go across the Board. It's just on General File. It will be treated the same as a bill, but there is no need to move it across the Board.

SENATOR PROUD: All right. Then, I move to adopt.

SPEAKER: Motion is to adopt LR 9. The chair has five hands and a second of moving the previous question. The question is shall the debate now close on LR 9. All those in favor will vote aye to close debate. All those opposed will vote no. Have you all voted? The clerk will record.

CLERK: 40 ayes, 5 nays, 4 not voting on previous question.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Proud. For what purpose do you rise, Senator?

SENATOR PROUD: Just to be sure about the ruling of the chair.

SPEAKER: Well, stand by.

SENATOR PROUD: I want this ruling correct and one other thing, Mr. President. I trust I am in order here.

SPEAKER: Yes sir.

SENATOR PROUD: In my enthusiasm, I forgot something. There is a typographical error in the Resolution because it refers to Resolution 83 of the last session where it should be Resolution 86 and I ask unanimous consent to correct this typographical error and I have the correction here.

SPEAKER: Are there objections? There is objection to it, Senator Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Well, Mr. President, this is just the word... the figure 83 was inserted when it should have been 86. This has nothing to do with the merits of it. I can't imagine anybody making...who is objecting to that?

SPEAKER: I think I heard a feminine voice. Senator Marsh.

SENATOR PROUD: Senator Marsh, now are you really serious about objecting to that on a straight technicality. All right, then, I move that this amendment be adopted.

SPEAKER: The chair recognizes Senator Marsh.

SENATOR MARSH: May I point out to you, sir, that the very
