

LB 448

CLERK: A motion on the desk.

PRESIDENT: Read the motion on the desk.

CLERK: I move to withdraw LB 448. Signed, Senator Barnett.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President, members of the body, I think.. no, when we objected to it.

PRESIDENT: Pardon me. Senator Syas, did you wish to be recognized? Senator Barnett has the floor. To what do you... That's right. He just read the motion...or explaining the motion.

SENATOR BARNETT: Thank you. I thought you was.

PRESIDENT: Proceed, Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Well, do I have to explain what I'm doing or do that tomorrow? Or Monday? I'm just moving to have the bill withdrawn.

PRESIDENT: That's fine. You can explain it.

SENATOR BARNETT: The purpose, Mr. President and members of the body, is that the City Council and the Mayor have sent to the Lincoln delegation the Resolution that will appear on the ballot in approximately two weeks. We told them that if it appeared on the ballot that we would withdraw the bill and I think it's of necessity that we do this to stand by our word.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett, the chair would observe that if you want to make your motion to withdraw the bill. You can suspend the Rules and do that and ask for 30 votes and that's your privilege. What is your pleasure.

SENATOR BARNETT: Well, I would like to do that. I'd like to ask to suspend the Rules so we could take care of it right now.

PRESIDENT: Is there any further discussion of the motion to withdraw LB 448. Senator Syas.

SENATOR SYAS: No objection, I just want to make one little statement, is all, because it sticks in my craw.
