

LB 268, 193, 342  
March 20, 1973

PRESIDENT: The question is shall LB 268 be advanced from General File to E & R Initial. All those in favor vote aye. All those opposed vote no. You are voting on the advancement of LB 268 from General File to E & R Initial and the chair would inquire if you have all voted. Once again, have you all voted? The clerk will record.

CLERK: 28 ayes, 16 nays, 5 not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: LB 268 is advanced. Brings up the General File consideration of LB 193. Senator Murphy, the chair would observe that your green light seems to be restored so... Yes, I think we were considering 193 and 342 in relation to each other. I believe that the chair remembers we had finished the discussion of 193 and were just about to move on to the discussion of 342. While the clerk is getting set here and while we are getting set for the debate on the next bill, the chair would like to have the privilege of introducing 36 Mid-City Senior Citizens from Omaha. Their Director is Sister Janet Daul. They are seated in the north balcony. There are some from Senator Cavanaugh's district and a few from Senator Skarda's district and we are delighted to have you here today as observers to the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature. Thank you for coming down. We know that a considerable amount of effort is expended in just your getting here. We recognize that and appreciate your attendance. Also, seated...Senator Maresh, was that under the north balcony or south balcony? Under the South balcony is seated Mr. Joseph Maresh from Dodge, Nebraska who is Chairman of the ETW Commission who is no relative but just a friend of Senator Maresh and we are delighted to have the Chairman of the Educational Television Commission here today as an observer to the Nebraska Unicameral and seated under the north balcony is a group of ladies from Hamilton County that are visiting the Legislature this morning. They are friends of Senator Kremer's. We are delighted to have the ladies here, also, as observers to the Nebraska Unicameral Legislature. We hope that all of you enjoy your visit to the Capitol city and that you enjoy the deliberations here in the body this morning. That was a very historic debate that we just had on the death penalty bill and we are moving now to the...if you watch the Board up behind me, of course, you, probably, have discovered that the number of the bill that is being debated is put up there by our new voting machine here. What is the condition now of LB 193 and 342. Attention please.

CLERK: Mr. President, the condition is just the bills are before us. The motions were laid over from yesterday. Both bills were being discussed. No action has been taken on anything.

PRESIDENT: We had 193 and what amendments on it?

CLERK: Well, the motion to kill, primarily.

PRESIDENT: That's right. That one is pending and that one was bypassed temporarily while we went on to discuss, I believe, 342.

CLERK: That's right.

PRESIDENT: OK. Senator Clark, we are back then to you for your presentation on LB 342. Are there...there are no Committee amendments, then, to 342?

CLERK: Yes, there are Committee amendments on it.

PRESIDENT: All right. In light...Senator Clark, in light of what we have sort of tentatively agreed to do, I think we will discuss 342 without the amendments, unless you have some comment regarding this in that we were sort of not taking amendments to the bills. We were just discussing the bills as
