

SENATOR KEYES: I would just like to say again that, Senator Marvel has pointed out when it's so obvious to all of us, the same thing that Senator Carpenter has touched upon. I think that it's very obvious that no agency head is going to come before a Legislative committee and ask for funds in excess of those recommended by the executives, the man who appointed him to his job. It's just not conducive to long life in government. It never has been and it never will be. I think you can go a little further than that. My friend, Senator Richendifer who's down there getting his directions from Senator Mahoney, referred to canned speeches and I'd like to ask him if he'd get back here to his chair, if he spoke to anyone in regard to this bill. You see, these fellows, Senator Keyes, do not, do not speak their own minds. They speak what they're told to say. It's just that simple and it depends upon whether or not the members of this body have got the courage to stand up and do what they think is right.

SPEAKER: If the Chair may break in here for a moment. I have a speaking order that I'm going to follow and you just put on your light if you want to, want the floor. I know he did but he had no right to ask the question in the first-- all right, all right, Senator Richendifer answer the question and then Senator Mahoney and then we're going to follow the regular order.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: Speak about convictions, if Senator Schmit would look at the record, I voted against this bill across the board.

SPEAKER: Senator Mahoney.

SENATOR MAHONEY: I'm going to say a little further. I was going to sit in my seat and be a good boy, but my friend that is so stubborn and I say that politely because he is my friend, he just wants his own way. If he doesn't have his way on every bill in this Legislature from helicopters to overriding the Budget Committee, he's not happy and I'm not happy that he attacked me this morning and the people who have to run for reelection the next two years are the poor sad people in this Legislature who keep voting to override the veto. He's in for 4 years. He's safe and that's why he's up here giving the great lecture and the great preaching today.

SPEAKER: Senator Keyes, I'll give you one minute.

SENATOR KEYES: Well, Mr. President, I had asked Senator Marvel a question and I expected to comment on his answer and I seem to have 5 people that followed in place of me through a sequence of questions and in one minute I may be able to say. I want you to know that Senator Marvel did exactly what I thought he would say, that the Executive branch of the government, whether it's the President of the United States or whether it's the Governor of this State, is not the absolute control and as a Senator of the House back in Washington and as a legislator here, I want you to know that if we pass this bill over the Governor's veto, that does not mean that the Governor and Colonel Kruger are going to hire the men. It simply means that they have that much more opportunity to impound that much more money and not go ahead. We have no absolute saying that they will hire these people. This is the thing I wanted to get across and Senator Marvel has said, made it very clear, that this is what is going to happen. We will not hire them even if we pass this bill.

SPEAKER: You did it in 59 seconds. Senator Clark.

SENATOR CLARK: Well, I'm almost afraid to get up after you are cutting everyone off in one minute. The only thing I wanted to say was, to make my position crystal clear as our President says, why I voted against this bill. In the first place I think
