those and then if not, I'll recognize Senator Carstens here in a minute for his comments.

SENATOR MURPHY: I just wanted to clarify the fact that x-ray is specified as covered.

PRESIDENT: Now, Senator Carstens, did you care to respond? It's difficult to transcribe, of course, the proceedings here if there is a dialogue on the floor and that's the only reason I was trying to--

SENATOR CARSTENS: Well, I'm trying to pick up this conversation we have, I have with Senator Murphy. I'm, I'm not trying to cloud up anything, I'm not, --

PRESIDENT: That's fine--

SENATOR CARSTENS: I'm not, I'm certainly not trying to misrepresent anything here. The bill is long, it's entangled, it's technical and it's rather difficult to pick up. It is very limited in the payments in many respects. I have lost it again. Well, I'll pass it up for the time being and see if I can locate it.

PRESIDENT: All right then, next to speak is Senator Hasebroock.

SENATOR HASEBROOCK: Mr. President and Members of the Legislature. As a member of the Banking and Insurance Committee I just wanted to substantiate the committee's action. I think the committee acted to kill both bills and I think if one's brought out, they should both be brought out. I think there is no reason that, I think the general public is going to be a little bit disappointed in the no fault premise of the insurance. I don't think they're going to get exactly what they expect to get, but if they bring out one, I would hope they would bring them both out.

PRESIDENT: Thank you, Senator Hasebroock. Is there any further discussion of Senator Waldron's motion here? I have some lights left on and I'm not sure who wants to speak. Senator Duis, if you're through speaking, why don't you turn your light off. Senator Hasebroock, would you turn yours off. Excuse me, did you want to speak again? Well, wait just a minute. Senator Murphy, are you through speaking; if so, turn your light off for me and Senator Proud also. Apparently Senator Proud wants to speak again. All right, Senator Duis, are you yielding the floor to Senator Proud?

SENATOR DUIS: Yes and I'll follow Senator Proud.

PRESIDENT: All right. Chair recognizes Speaker Proud.

SENATOR PROUD: Yes, Mr. President, I just want to apologize to Senator Syas and Senator Duis. I don't whether we're both offended or both complimented, but--

SENATOR DUIS: Well, it would depend a lot on whether I was ever shot or not like Senator Syas was. If I had been shot like he is, I would not be offended but beings I wasn't, I am!

SENATOR PROUD: When I was referring to--

PRESIDENT: --get into that this morning.

SENATOR PROUD: When I was referring to the insurance expert, I meant Senator Duis. I guess I inadvertently said Senator Syas, but just one point that might be of interest to the body.
