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put up additional money in order to pay at least a part on the same relationship they are now paying for ADC, but once you're committed to that, you're committed for not just now but at least as I understand it, for an additional period of time. Now this whole program of welfare cannot be separated piecemeal as we come to it unless this body wants to understand the financial obligation you're putting on the people of this State including the County. It's not a question of sympathy or one's concern for the poor. I don't think that has anything to do with it. I think everybody has that desire and has that compassion, some more than others apparently, but there comes a time when we're going to have to make up our mind how far we going to go. Now there was nobody except Senator, from Lincoln, and I understand Senator Chambers' problem in his area because it's there more and more pronounced than probably any other part of the State, but no one said they have had any requests for either one of these bills and you have, I'm sure you have, at least as many people say we've gone far enough at least insofar as where ability to pay is concerned. Now it seemed to me with the undetermined area of the participation by the Federal Government, we should not pass either one of these bills, and I don't take any great pride in making that statement, but the comment doesn't take any courage on my part either. There comes a time when this body has to become realistic and I think we should not pass either one of these bills until there are enough people in this State, particularly those on welfare, without being stimulated, come to us and say, we've got to have more help. I can go in the areas where I am supposed to represent them to the best of my ability, which part of the time is not very good, and the people there, like the people on welfare, they're beginning to wonder how far they can eat and these are the people who are working, some of them on ADC too. I'd be the first one to admit that the price of food and everything else has gone up by leaps and bounds and I don't know how they're going to live and I don't know what the answer is to it either but I think we're going to have--if that is the problem, they're going to have to consider the whole area rather than those on welfare. I don't know what to do and I don't think you do either, but this is the time to be concerned about not compassion, but the other area which to me is just as important. The Federal Government is getting the habit of leaving us with those things they participate and leave us doing it all and then they put us in a position where we can't quit doing it even if we want to do it. Now, I'd like to have Senator Marvel, he's an expert in this field, I don't think there's anybody in the State of Nebraska who is as qualified as he is to understand the expenditure of public money. He's spent hours and hours, way beyond the normal call of duty, more than any member of this body has ever done or probably ever will do, and I'd like to have him verify at least in whole or part; I've, continue the discussion till we get an overall problem of what we're confronting ourselves with. I think that's important that we do it now and not do it later after we've done something and then wonder how we're going to fund this. Senator Marvel, I hope you'll take from there and continue the discussion.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Marvel because he has been requesting the floor for some time, so it's your turn anyway, Senator Marvel.

SENATOR MARVEL: I, well, I yield to Senator Chambers for a moment with the permission of the Chair and then I'll come back.
