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the six year lease at that time and we are in the six year lease expiration period. We have the one year lease. We have the twelve year lease and of all the leases that are coming in the very near future, I know Senator Whitney's amendment then attempts to correct that to some degree. I do not agree with Senator Whitney in his amendment or his statement that this Board does not want to sell these lands. I have visited with them over these many years, not only this year, '71 and '72 and very likely, '69. This current Board does want to sell school lands but they want to sell in orderly fashion. I think Senator Lewis' bill is the orderly fashion which can be used much better than the amendment that Senator Whitney has to accomplish this job. It is going to take some time and it should take some time to sell these lands. This may be a high period in land values and it may not be but it is the time that we can dispose of in an orderly fashion and I think that our Board as it is composed today feels this way. So, I would hope that we vote Senator Whitney's amendment down and proceed with the bill as Senator Lewis has explained and as that bill is before us now.

SPEAKER: Are you ready for the question? Yes, Senator Whitney, you may close.

SENATOR WHITNEY: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I am really surprised at what Senator Burbach just said because these men do not want to sell. They have never wanted to sell. There might be one or two of them that is willing to sell if the law is mandated that they offer for sale, but I will wager that there won't be very many lands sold and I am not in the market to buy any of those lands either, I want you to know. Now, Senator Lewis points out that the Supreme Court declared these unconstitutional, the land sale bill
