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developed more and more bills which dealt with some uniform measure, many of these seems to me would be well as a matter of practice if they were introduced first or the odd, number year of session, and then held over for the interim period between the even number sessions in which that particular committee could then take testimony, review those bills, in that interim period and be doing so with a concrete proposal rather than what we sometimes have. I can appreciate the reluctance to sending everything back, I think that one of the reasons that was suggested was that some bills have already been put out on general file for no other reason than to keep them alive and this is one way to get them back, perhaps it would be better to select some of those that should be and will be used for interim study purposes and have them returned to the committee if the bills remain in committee can remain alive. There is no connection as far as I'm concerned Senator Syas with any of the things relative to state aid to schools, cause there is no point in keeping those alive as I see it in the interim period, I would assume they would all be passed and enacted this session in any event so that those that are necessary wouldn't be any need to hold them, but that would not be the motivating force, the only reason it seems to me is the interim study committees and standing committees are the same, that those items which that standing committee are going to consider during the interim period ought to be in that committee for their study purposes.

PRESIDENT: Any further discussion now of the proposed rule change. Senator Carpenter.

SENATOR CARPENTER: Well I've heard a lot of rule changes but none like this. Just think, we're going to send all the bills back to the committees that have put them out, the complexion of the committee is identically the same as they were as they were put out, we don't have any more interim study committees they are the standing committees as I understand it, and every bill that requires a study will be sent to that committee, which probably reported these bills out that might be reference to that. Now I don't know what the objective is, I talked to Senator Maresh, the only thing he had in mind was to kill the bills in committee which were not reported out on general file, certainly I see nothing wrong with that, but to send all these bills back, to the same committee, with the same membership would be sheer nonsense. It's a complete waste of time. This session when we started we wasted about three weeks because we didn't have anything to do, and we didn't have anything to do because of nothing on general file. If you want to go back to that again, unless you just expect the committee to pull them all out, speaking for the Judiciary Committee only as a member and the miscellaneous subjects I don't see any way or any reason why we should change what we did. You're putting a crowd on the membership of any committee we really didn't know what we're doing, maybe we didn't but we don't want to admit to it, and I think this is too far fetched, and I see no good that can come from it, and I don't expect those people who made the motion to expect any good to come from it. We kill more good bills in this committee then we do bad ones, and the whole method of this whole operation is by those people who sit outside of this audit, they're the ones that raise hell with us, they're the ones that give us sense of direction too often, then they should, and they're the ones that kill a lot of bills in committee that ought to be on this floor. I think that any bill of any importance ought to be on the floor, and when 49 members take the responsibility of passing or killing it. What's wrong with that? Why should a committee exercise it's judgement on an important bill in order to preclude this body from having a hearing on it on this floor? Lots of times it's done because of the people who appeared against the bill, just read the bills where they are killed, who appeared against the bill, that's what happens
