

wheat harvest, milo and corn harvest, usually, probably 60 days, 60 to 90 days. They can use these vehicles and, of course, what many are doing is own maybe one or two of these trailers which they can leave set in the field to fill and then either haul in to their local elevator or some place further. It also assists in unloading because, in essence, they're unloading three loads compared to one in terms of time within the elevator because of the larger load that the permit would also be restricted and used the same as a farm license is for their own agricultural produce and they could not do any commercial hauling on it, but again as I say, if they would pay the State the full rate of a commercial vehicle but be able to have it for 30-day periods because the rest of the year they make no use of them, they still would continue to pay the full ad valorem tax on the, on the entire rig so there'd be no change there, only the permission for a 30-day license.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Duis.

SENATOR DUIS: A question of Senator Warner, if I might. Senator Warner, don't we already have the right of a farm license plate for this particular situation except for the semi trailer?

SENATOR WARNER: No. The, well I'm not aware that you can get a 30-day license--

SENATOR DUIS: No, I mean the year around farm plate to be able to do this at the present time?

SENATOR WARNER: --year around farm plate for a straight truck--

SENATOR DUIS: That's right, the only exception to that is on a semi trailer, isn't it?

SENATOR WARNER: On a semi trailer you cannot get a farm license and I'm not asking for a farm license--

SENATOR DUIS: No, no I'm not trying to, I'm just saying that I, I didn't think, the only thing was that I thought you needed in here was a semi trailer.

SENATOR WARNER: The committee amendment struck straight truck, the bill as originally was written--

SENATOR DUIS: All right. Thank you very much.

SENATOR WARNER: --straight truck which was stricken. That should not have been in there to start with.

SPEAKER: Chair recognizes Senator Richendifer.

SENATOR RICHENDIFER: I'd like to ask Senator Warner a question. Historically, the farmers have always traded equipment and labor. I'm wondering if by putting in there their own use, that maybe you might be defeating part of your purpose, that if your neighbor comes over and says, would you haul my grain to town, that you'd be in violation of this bill. I, the bill is all right but I'm just wondering if, if you're not restricting it.

SENATOR WARNER: In line 8, it includes the same language as the farm truck which, used by farmers and ranchers in exchange for services which would permit the exchange of help that you, we referred to. It would still be possible.

SENATOR DUIS: But, but, but this, there would be no money change hands, in other words?
