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perform as far as the Governor is concerned.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Then to get to the, I guess if it was deductive logic, to get to the point at hand then, if these people were elected for specific responsibilities, are the provisions under 452 generalist responsibility, the budget, management and so forth and are you trying to transfer specific administrators to general administrative duties?

SENATOR MARVEL: No sir. I don't think so because the one point that we tried to make a while ago is that one of the deficiencies of the Department of Administrative Services and this goes back to the beginning, it has nothing to do with any particular administration; one of the deficiencies has been from the beginning that they have not taken into account the--the input, the suggestions, the experience of the user agencies including those of the Executive Branch and so when, when we say, are we trying to make generalists out of executive specialists, my answer to you would be not entirely because we are asking or emphasizing the fact that this whole business of producing information is a cooperative matter whether you're a specialist or a generalist.

SENATOR F. LEWIS: Now, Mr. President, if I could make my remarks after asking those questions. First of all, let me tell you that it's wonderful not to be involved in the political struggles that go on here because of your newness and lack of effectiveness so I don't have anything to say for the Governor or against him. I think that there is some very serious concerns on my part in regard to a bill that is specifically geared to an individual situation. Again, I'm not, I've had, I haven't said fifteen words, I suppose to Gus Liske. I probably know who he is but I've heard a lot about him and if he's ineffective, or if he's doing the wrong job, let's get rid of him, one way or another, but I think that we're on shaky grounds if the specifics of this bill is geared to take care of a current situation with a current director of the Department of Administrative Services and a current Governor. Those of you who know me know that I was Re--that I am a Republican, that I supported Governor Niemann last time, but I don't think that's the issue, and I would say to you that you ought to look at this very carefully as to what the intent is and what our purposes is and I think that we get in trouble in this Legislature time and time again when we pass a general law that has long reaching responsibilities and long reaching effects when we're trying to get at a problem area. No one knows any better than I do how difficult it is to come up with research material; not only from Department of Administrative Services but from other services. University of Nebraska gives it up rather grudgingly, I'll tell you that for sure, but I don't think that we get at that by passing a general law restricting or proposing a commission that might do something that we might not like at all so I'd say to you and again, without partisanship involved certainly on my part, tha--and simply as a student of government, that we could be in for some real severe problems by using this kind of legislation. Now if my good Senator Chambers wants revenge on the Governor or anybody else, have at it, you know, but let's not do that by messing up a very important and integral system of government. Now I would think if 452 goes through, I would think that the commission itself would have to introduce the budget and the commission itself would be responsible for the Executive budget and would have to defend it and would probably have to run on it. The Secretary of State would probably have to run by saying that; well on the budget matters I recommended this in penalty. I recommended this in mental health, or the Attorney General would have to say, I recommended this and I would think that that would put the Attorney General in a bad situation. He no longer is a legal advisor aloof from the political processes. I believe he's involved in it and again, it was with great
