the means I set forth in three areas, raise the tax on premiums, insurance companies, number two tax intangibles, for bills or less, number three adopt the service tax of the bills on general file, which will raise forty million dollars, I'll vote for that bill, and I'll vote to make it a hundred percent, but I'll be damned if I'll do it till we raise the money to do it.

PRESIDENT: Now Senator Carpenter, does the Chair understand you are withdrawing your motion? Alright, are there objections to Senator Carpenter withdrawing his motion on 235 on select file. Hearing none, so ordered, the motion is withdrawn. We now have Senator Snyder's motion.

CLERK: Mr. President I ask to have 235 bracketed indefinitely, on final reading, signed Senator Snyder.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Snyder for his motion.

SENATOR SNYDER: Mr. President and members of the body, very briefly, as I stated an hour ago it's my earnest belief that there are very few people in this body who fully understand welfare, and it's my belief that this body individually and collectively would be very much in good stead with the people to take time to understand what we are doing in this area of welfare. As it's been pointed out in subsequent speeches often times there are votes that are based on lack of full information, they are based on emotion etc., and because of the reasons that have been stated in this hour of debate regarding what or what not Uncle Sam is or cannot going to be doing, I say let's go slow, let's be sure of what we are doing, rather than doing something that we are going to have to regret later, let's be sure of what we are doing, so I'd ask that 235 be bracketed on final reading, hopefully with the idea that when 404 comes up, we can talk about welfare, not just on an emotional basis, but we can have figures and things to compare with. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Stahmer, passing. Senator Schmit, the motion is to bracket 235 on final reading.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President and members of the legislature, I support Senator Snyder's motion to bracket the bill on final reading indefinitely.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It's Senator Schmit's bill but I'm opposed to bracketing it indefinitely. If Senator Schmit was willing to bracket it for a week rather than indefinitely, I would go along with that because it is his bill, but just because a man introduces a piece of legislation and signs his name to it, it does not mean that it is his to do with as he chooses. There are grave issues involved in this bill, and I do not think that what Senator Snyder wants should be given to him. I'm not dealing in personalities with the iron man, that's what they refer to him in Omaha because he opposes me and that's quite a tremendous compliment that they pay me just because a man opposes me it automatically makes him an iron man but more power to him and his. But Senator Snyder took some state tax money to go out to California to study welfare for a couple of days and now he is an authority. He knows everything. He wants us to bracket this bill about which he is not shown any particular expertise till he brings out his bill 404, then lo and behold, like God said, let there be light, Senator Snyder said let there be light and the whole legislature is going to know everything about welfare, you're going to take Senator Snyder's bill he is going to explain how in a job depressed market you can make
