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the complete discussion, the Governor said that if it is necessary to have an extra appointment for the Department of Medical Services, that is OK with him and he still wants us very much to approve of this gentleman as Director of the Department of Institutions. Dr. Anderson is a Nebraska boy who earned his own way through high school and through college and went into the Army for many years. He is a very personal fellow. He is very likeable. He is very compassionate. We have had many testimonies on his competence and now he has come back to Nebraska at, apparently, a request by a former head of the Medical, Lincoln Regional Center who kept correspondence with this gentleman all during his army career and he wanted him to come back to Nebraska, and this Dr. Coats, whom I am speaking of, took a vote of the six staff members yesterday morning in the Lincoln Regional Center and each and every one is overwhelmingly in favor of Dr. Anderson. I do not know of any better man in the state of Nebraska for this job. I feel that he has plans available and that I have handed out to you a report on his plans for Nebraska. They are very commendable and I feel definitely that we should approve of Dr. Anderson as the Director of Institutions.

PRESIDENT: The chair recognizes Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Senator Barnett.

SENATOR BARNETT: I would have to rise to oppose the appointment of Dr. Anderson to the head of the Department of Institutions and to present some of the argument against Senator Whitney's actions throughout the past two or three weeks. I'd have to agree with Senator Whitney that they, Dr. Coats, probably took the example and took the vote of the people that work under Dr. Anderson and they, probably, all did vigorously support him because if they didn't, they would probably be looking for work tomorrow. This makes no sense at all in what he is trying to bring up. I think you have all read the minority report and I would apologize if I was late in delivering it. I had understood the minority report could be presented to the body of Legislators at the proper time, and when Senator Whitney presented us, I believe it was Thursday with the copy that it was to be in his hands by Wednesday or Thursday, I did produce it up till that time of what we had done. I apologize for not having it there the day before. I, in no way, expected or tried to trick anybody. I think it is entirely possible that Senator Whitney has not heard from the opposition to this man because I think that everybody in this state and possibly in some areas of the country know what Dr. Anderson means to Senator Whitney. They are very good friends and I don't resent that. I don't think anybody does and if I had a man I was fighting for I'd fight the same way that Senator Whitney is. I do want you to pay particular attention to one of the things that Senator Whitney brought up this morning just a minute ago. He reads off a commendable list of people that testified in favor of Dr. Anderson, and, then, for some reason or other, on the other side when they opposed him they seemed to be citizens, citizens. Not much of a list of titles and things like this behind their name. I don't know where they are at. I am sure that some of them have titles that they didn't show up. I, also, would like to say this, that there is nobody in their right mind in the profession that Dr. Anderson is in that is going to come in and testify against him unless they are so strongly opposed to the man which was the case in two or three of these gentlemen. I can also tell you that all of the letters that opposed him are not listed. This is a onesided report that Senator Whitney has put in the Journal and I think it was trying to serve his purpose. Again, from the start of the Committee on Committees when we had these hearings, it was a case of trying to get through the hearing without having
